NOTICE, VOTERS

The attention of the voters and land owners of the Owyhee Irrigation district is called to the fact that an election will be held on July 3, 1926, for the purpose of voting upon the adoption of the contract between the Owyhee Irrigation District and the United States Government for the construction of the Owyhee Irrigation system.

We especially urge that all voters make a special effort to vote at this election. It is the desire of the Board of Directors that as large a vote as possible be cast on that day approving the contract, as the board feels that it will be of considerable advantage to have a particularly large vote cast that the officers of the reclamation service may feel that the land owners within the district are eager to have the reclamation service proceed with the construction of the system, as provided in said contract.

The copy of the proposed contract is at the office of E. M. Blodgett, Nyssa, Oregon, where the same may be examined by any person interested.

If the vote cast on July 3 at said election is favorable, and

the government of the United States begins construction of the system, it will result in the greatest development this section of the country has ever known.

We again urge all legal voters within the district to vote at said election, and to make a special effort to get as large a vote as possible out on that day.

TALKING HONEY

In the interest of economy the thrifty housewife is apt to set the price of a gallon of honey against the price of a gallon of sorghum or corn syrup, and say, "we can't afford honey." Maybe she hasn't gone far enough, and honey is really the cheaper.

Chemical analysis of alfalfa honey made by the U. S. Department of Agriculture (Browne, Bulletin 110, 1908) and of cane sugar molasses made by the Canadian Internal Revenue Department (Babbington, Bul. 25), indicates that honey, because of its greater density and its greater sugar content, has about 50 per cent more sweetening value than the best cane molasses. By the same authorities we learn that the best cane syrup contains about 30 per cent water, while a good grade of honey only contains 17 per cent of water. Good pure honey contains 81 per cent of sugar sweet, while the sugar sweet in the best molasses is but 60 per cent.

From reliable data which has been collected from scientific sources we may reasonably conclude that honey is a more economical food at \$1.50 per gallon than the best syrups that sell around a dollar.

Before the mother of a numerous brood decides that she cannot afford honey because of its cost, and will use molasses instead, she should consider its greater weight per gallon, its greater sweetening value, pound for pound, with molasses, its greater ease of digestion in the little stomachs, and its preservative value to the teeth. (See Alfred McCann in Dental Digest for April, 1922) Add to these facts the deliciousness of honey, and you'll decide that honey is an ideal food from every possible standpoint.

At a meeting of the Children's Farm Home on June 12 it was decided to continue the work of the Farm Home office under the same management until January 1, 1927. The committee consists of J. Allen Harrison, treasurer of the board, Mrs. Mary L. Mallett, president of the W. C. T. U., and Mrs. Madge J. Mears, office secretary.

We are glad to report that the Home is in fine condition. Our big family of 116 children are very happy and busy in making garden, raising chickens, caring for the flowers and doing the many things that delight children in helping about a home. There is no debt except the \$10,000 on the land and that is all pledged to be paid by January 1, 1927, with \$5600 in the treasury ready for payment. We appreciate the ready response from the churches and Sunday schools, from the Mother's Day offering, amounting to date to \$1409.98. While we realize there are many churches not heard from yet, we hope all will take an offering for the Home some time during the year, if they could not do so on Mother's Day.

The Committee decided to cooperate and do all they can to further the work of the campaigns for the southern Oregon cottage, the Coos county cottage and any other cottage that may be carried on for the Home. We are in great need of more cottages, as we are having to refuse very needy children every week.

The bazaar for the Farm Home will be held as usual at the State Fair. We will be very glad to receive donations from any individual or organization that can help. 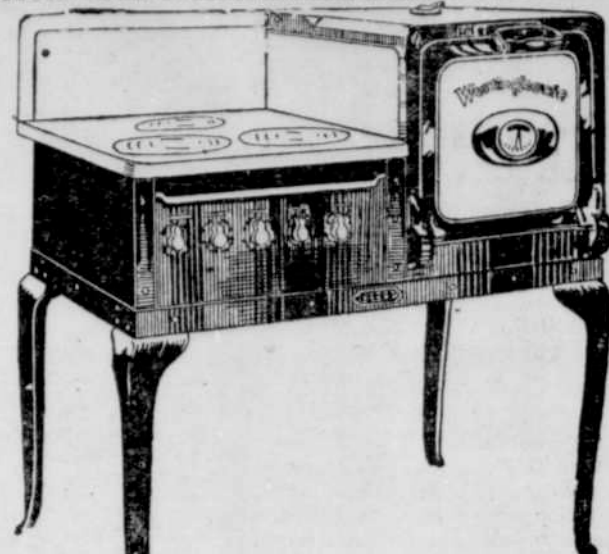

Owyhee Irrigation District

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a special election will be held on Saturday, the 3rd day of July, 1926, in the Southeast Quarter of the North east Quarter (SE1/4 NE1/4) of Section Twenty-six (26), Township Nineteen (19) South, Range Forty-six (46) East of the Willamette Meridian in the County of Malheur and State of Oregon, said voting place being about three miles northwest of Nyssa, Oregon, within the Owyhee Irrigation District in Malheur County, Oregon, at which there will be submitted to the electors of said District, the question whether said District shall be authorized to enter into contract with the United States providing for the construction of the Owyhee Project by the United States, and the payment of a proportionate part of the actual cost thereof by the District, said proportionate part of such cost to be determined as in said contract provided, and the total construction obligation of the District not to exceed the sum of \$13,000,000.00.

A copy of the draft of said proposed contract approved as to form by the Secretary of the Interior, is on file with the Secretary of said District and may be examined by any person interested.

The polls shall be opened at 8 o'clock in the morning of the day of election and kept open until 5 o'clock in the afternoon, when the same shall be closed.

At such election the ballots shall contain the words: "Contract with the United States—Yes," and "Contract with the United States—No." Said election shall be held, and the results thereof determined in all respects as nearly as practicable in conformity with the provisions of law governing the election of irrigation

district officers.
