TALKING HONEY

Honey is relished by others than human beings, and to an extent that often works considerable havoc in the apiary. Skunks have sometimes become such a pest in beeyards as almost to depopulate the working force and, of course, reduce the amount of honey that would be stored the balance of the season. Mr. Skunk dearly loves honey and at night time visits hives after hives, taps on the front of each, and as the bees creep out to discover the nature of the intrusion, he swipes them off with his paws and into his mouth—bees, honey, stings and all!

The partiality of bears for honey is well known. Apiaries in mountain valleys and in the cut-over woodlands of Wisconsin, Michigan and other states are sometimes subject to bear raids, upsetting the hives and doing much damage. Horses, too, occasionally develop a honey appetite and upset the hives in pasture apiaries, in their efforts to obtain the coveted sweet. Occasionally a colt will be found with his nose swelled up and full of stings, the result of monkeying with a beehive.

Toads are fond of bees and honey, and in low lying apiaries do much damage. They visit the hives at dusk and snap up the unfortunate honey maker who is late in getting home. If the supply of belated workers is not sufficiently plentiful, his toadship reaches one long, clammy foreleg into the entrance and coaxes them out. The stings do not seem to bother him. Beemasters, the well known king bird, also hangs around the apiaries, and snatches the bees in their flight. Ants and wasps sometimes invade the hives in quantity and pester the inmates in their search for sweets.

In South Africa the natives esteem the larvae of the honey bees rather than the honey, and the white beekeepers sometimes find their hives overturned and their apiaries almost ruined by savages in their quest for bee brood.

Verily, the bee's life isn't all blossoms and honey!

Polls Big Vote

The Owyhee District election held Saturday to vote on the acceptance of the contract with the government to water the lands within the district proved conclusively that the landowners are interested in the matter and are rarin' to go. One hundred and two votes were cast. 101 in favor and one against. The negative vote was cast through mistake, however, and was intended to be in favor, so that the voting was really unanimous. Voters came from as far as Weiser on the north and Sutor creek on the south.

The board of directors met Tuesday and canvassed the vote, ascertaining the above facts. The judges of election were W. B. Hoxie, chairman; A. R. Millar and H. F. Brown. The validity of the election and all the legal aspects of the proceedings will in the near future come before Judge Biggs' court for confirmation, when if no flaws are discovered the legal proceedings will have been concluded and actual construction will be in order.

Under the terms of the contract the lands of the district, about 100,000 acres, are bonded in the sum of \$13,000,000, which will be paid off in annual installments extending over a period of 40 years. It is estimated that the cost of construction and cost of maintenance will amount to about \$5 per acre annually, which is much less than the settlers under many ditches are paying for water alone. It is the poor man's chance to get a home.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a special election will be held on Saturday, the 3rd day of July, 1926, in the Southeast Quarter of the North east Quarter (SE¹/₄ NE¹/₄) of Section Twenty-six (26), Township Nineteen (19) South, Range Forty-six (46) East of the Willamette Meridian in the County of Malheur and State of Oregon, said voting place being about three miles northwest of Nyssa, Oregon, within the Owyhee Irrigation District in Malheur County, Oregon, at which there will be submitted to the electors of said District, the question whether said District shall be authorized to enter into contract with the United States providing for the construction of the Owyhee Project by the United States, and the payment of a proportionate part of the actual cost thereof by the District, said proportionate part of such cost to be determined as in said contract provided, and the total construction obligation of the District not to exceed the sum of \$18,000,000.00.

The polls shall be opened at 8 o'clock in the morning of the day of election and kept open until 5 o'clock in the afternoon, when the same shall be closed.

At such election the ballots shall contain the words: "Contract with the United States—Yes," and "Contract with the United States—No." Said election shall be held, and the results thereof determined in all respects as nearly as practicable in conformity with the provisions of law governing the election of irrigation

district officers.
