Carroll Stahl, a member of the senior class of the Harrisburg Academy, has invented a railroad crossing signal that will at least minimize the danger of crossing railroads when there are no watchmen around. One patent has been granted on his device and another is pending. A western signal-construction company is now building a trial signal from his plans.

The signal is an improvement on the type used in Maine and in the states west of the Mississippi. A cross arm mounted on a pole carries a red light at each end and a pendulum pivoted at the intersection. At the approach of a train electrical contacts set the pendulum swinging and "blink" the red lights.

Carroll Stahl is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Stahl of Lemoine. When he was but a boy of 15 he patented his first invention, that of a lock for a door.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a special election will be held on Saturday, the 3rd day of July, 1926, in the Southeast Quarter of the North east Quarter (SE1/4 NE1/4) of Section Twenty-six (26), Township Nineteen (19) South, Range Forty-six (46) East of the Willamette Meridian in the County of Malheur and State of Oregon, said voting place being about three miles northwest of Nyssa, Oregon, within the Owyhee Irrigation District in Malheur County, Oregon, at which there will be submitted to the electors of said District, the question whether said District shall be authorized to enter into contract with the United States providing for the construction of the Owyhee Project by the United States, and the payment of a proportionate part of the actual cost thereof by the District, said proportionate part of such cost to be determined as in said contract provided, and the total construction obligation of the District not to exceed the sum of \$13,000,000.00.

A copy of the draft of said proposed contract approved as to form by the Secretary of the Interior, is on file with the Secretary of said District and may be examined by any person interested.

The polls shall be opened at 8 o'clock in the morning of the day of election and kept open until 5 o'clock in the afternoon, when the same shall be closed.

At such election the ballots shall contain the words: "Contract with the United States—Yes," and "Contract with the United States—No." Said election shall be held, and the results thereof determined in all respects as nearly as practicable in conformity with the provisions of law governing the election of irrigation

district officers.
