Eat Less and Live Longer, Says Lawyer

Business and professional men working under high nervous pressure do not live as long as men whose pursuits keep them out of doors and active. Examine the records of longevity and you will find that on the average the longest-lived men are soldiers, sailors and farmers, all avocations which tend to keep a man at his physical best.

Man, in general, rolls down the hill of life fastest when his figure is rotund. "Leanness and longevity" is a good axiom for business men to remember. If office workers would eat a little less, they would add years to their lives.

Overfeeding is as dangerous to adults as underfeeding is to children. Foods difficult to digest, or which overstimulate, should be avoided by persons whose work does not require any particular amount of physical exercise. Yet thousands of business men eat as much as or more than men who do manual labor. And, inevitably, nature rebels and sickness results.

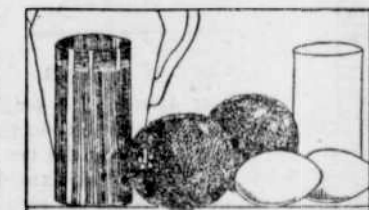
Many of the country's foremost executives eat but two meals a day, breakfast and dinner in the evening. They seek to keep the organs of the body from becoming clogged. Thousands of other business men confine themselves at noontime to custards, puddings, soups and other sustaining dishes made with milk, or evaporated milk, which is milk in its most sterile form, from which 60 per cent of the water has been removed by evaporation. Such a diet is light and readily assimilated.

There is no more necessary lesson to be learned by the brain worker than how to keep well and healthy by proper attention to food habits.

Eating Greater Cause of Death Than Drinking

Drink is the second greatest cause of disease and death. Food comes first, then drink. Excluding alcoholic beverages, there are dozens of drinks on the market today whose effect is detrimental, particularly to children. Milk is the best drink for children. Not only is it drink, but food as well—the most nearly perfect food known to man.

Milk is an all-the-year-round drink and for this reason the children often rebel against drinking it. This condition, however, may be overcome by the introduction of the mixed drink. Milk or diluted evaporated milk may be mixed with eggs or used in fruit juices or in some other way which will disguise the fact that the drink contains milk. In the hot summer months when the child naturally drinks more than in cooler weather, it is wise to vary the ways of serving milk, so as not to create a distaste for this important food.



In connection with mixed drinks, the following formulas for milk beverages may aid mothers in serving something new:

Iced Cocoa
3 tbsp. cocoa 1½ cups evaporated milk
2 tbsp. sugar 2 cups hot water
¼ cup hot water 1½ cups water
Few grains salt ¼ tsp. vanilla

Scald the diluted milk in a double boiler. Mix cocoa, sugar, salt and add the hot water. Cook over a low flame from 10 to 15 minutes, stirring occasionally to prevent burning. Add to the cocoa the scalded milk; return to the double boiler and continue cooking for 10 minutes. Add vanilla, chill before serving. Pour into tall glasses which contain a few small cubes of ice. Serve plain or top with whipped cream sprinkled with cinnamon. Serves four.

Egg-Nog
1 egg 2 cups ice water
Few grains salt 2 cups berry or cherry juice or nutmeg
Few grains salt 2 cups non-alcoholic sherry
2-3 cup cold evaporated milk

Separate white from yolk of egg. Add salt to white and beat until stiff. Beat yolk until thick and lemon colored and add the fruit juices, nutmeg and sugar. Combine diluted milk with yolk mixture. Pour into a tall glass and put the egg white on top. Sprinkle top with chopped nuts and serve at once. Serves one.

Orange-Nog
¼ cup orange juice 1-2 cup evaporated milk diluted with
Few grains salt 2 cups water
2-3 tsp. sugar 1-2 cup cold water
Add sugar and salt to orange juice and pour slowly into the diluted milk, stirring to mix thoroughly. Chill before serving. One-half tsp. lemon improves this drink for many. Serves one.

PETITION FOR ORGANIZATION IN THE COUNTY COURT FOR MALHEUR COUNTY, STATE OF OREGON.

In the Matter of the Organization of the ONTARIO-NYSSA IRRIGATION DISTRICT.

To the Honorable

The County Court for Malheur County, Oregon.

We, the undersigned petitioners, respectfully show and represent:

1. That each of the petitioners herein is a bona fide owner of one acre or more of land situated within the boundaries of the proposed irrigation district as hereinafter described, and whose name appears on the last assessment roll, or is the holder of an uncompleted contract to purchase State lands, or is an entryman upon the public lands of the United States, or is otherwise qualified under the laws of this State to petition for the organization of an irrigation district, and that together we constitute more than a majority of the land owners and entrymen of lands within said proposed boundaries.

2. That the lands included within the boundaries as hereinafter described are all irrigable lands and are susceptible of irrigation from the same source and by the same system of works; that said lands are now irrigated by a system consisting of a pumping plant, pipe line and ditches, pumping water out of the Snake River, and which system is owned by the Ontario-Nyssa Irrigation Company, a private corporation; that the lands within said boundary lines as described are also susceptible of irrigation from the Owyhee Project, a gravity project proposed to be constructed by the United States under the Reclamation Act, and that in order to contract with the United States for a water supply from that source, it is necessary that the lands within said proposed boundaries be organized as an irrigation district.

3. That the petitioners desire to organize, and hereby propose the organization of an irrigation district, within the boundaries hereinafter set forth, under the irrigation district laws of the State of Oregon, and particularly under the provisions of Title XII, Chapter XIV, Sections 7305 to 7344, inclusive Oregon Laws, and acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, providing for the organization and management of irrigation districts.

4. That it is the purpose of petitioners to organize an irrigation district for the irrigation of the lands within the boundaries as hereinafter described, and to that end to provide for the purchase, acquisition, construction, reconstruction, enlargement, betterment, extension, operation and maintenance of irrigation works already constructed or to be constructed, or for the assumption as principal or guarantor of indebtedness on account of district lands to the United States under the federal Reclamation laws, for the payment of a proportionate part of the cost of the construction of the Owyhee Project by the United States.

5. That your petitioners desire to have said district designated by the name of "ONTARIO-NYSSA IRRIGATION DISTRICT", and that the same be not divided into divisions, but that the directors may be elected from the District at large.

6. That the boundaries of said proposed district, and of the lands which it is desired to have included therein, are hereby set forth and particularly described as follows, to-wit:

Commencing at the point where the mid-channel of the Owyhee Canal belonging to the Owyhee Ditch Company, a corporation, as now constructed upon the ground, intersects the section line between sections Twenty-three (23) and Twenty-four (24), in Township Twenty (20) South, Range Forty-six (46) East, W. M., said point being at or near the quarter section corner on the West line of said Section Twenty-four (24), and extending thence in a general northerly direction along the mid-channel of said Owyhee Canal as now constructed, through Township Twenty (20) South, Range Forty-six (46) East, Township Nineteen (19) South, Ranges Forty-six (46) East, and Forty-seven (47), East, Township Eighteen (18) South, Range Forty-seven (47) East and into Township Eighteen (18) South, Range Forty-six (46) East, to the point where the mid-channel of said Owyhee Canal intersects the north line of Section Twenty-four (24), Township Eighteen (18) South, Range Forty-six (46) East, at or near the quarter section corner on the North line of said Section Twenty-four (24); thence West along the North line of said Section Twenty-four (24) and Section Twenty-three (23), to the northwest corner of section Twenty-three (23) in said township and range; thence South along the West line of said Section Twenty-three (23), to the point where said line intersects the

mid-channel of the ditch known as the Nevada Ditch, belonging to the Warm Springs Irrigation District, as now constructed on the ground; thence westerly along the mid-channel of said Nevada Ditch to the point where said ditch intersects the West line of Section Twenty-two (22), Township Eighteen (18) South, Range Forty-six (46) East, W. M.; thence South along the West line of said Section Twenty-two (22), to the point where the said section line intersects the mid-channel of the ditch known as the Ontario-Nyssa Canal, belonging to the Ontario-Nyssa Irrigation Company, a corporation, at or near the northwest corner of the Southwest Quarter of the Southwest Quarter (SW¼SW¼) of said Section Twenty-two (22), Township Eighteen (18) South, Range Forty-six (46) East, W. M.; thence in a general easterly and southerly direction, following along the mid-channel of said Ontario-Nyssa Canal, to the point where the pipe line of said Ontario-Nyssa Irrigation Company empties into said canal, on the east and west center line of Section Fourteen (14), Township Twenty (20) South, Range Forty-six (46) East, W. M.; thence continuing southerly along the mid-channel of the ditch of said Ontario-Nyssa Irrigation Company to the point where the same intersects the south line of said Section Fourteen (14); thence East along the South line of said Section Fourteen (14), to the southeast corner thereof; thence South along the West line of Section Twenty-four (24), to the point where said line intersects the mid-channel of the Owyhee Canal, at or near the quarter section corner on the West line of said Section Twenty-four (24), Township Twenty (20) South, Range Forty-six (46) East, W. M., the place of beginning.

7. That petitioners present herewith for the approval of this Court a good and sufficient bond in the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000) Dollars, which is more than double the amount of the probable cost of organizing such district, which bond is in the form and to the effect required by the irrigation district laws of Oregon.

WHEREFORE, your petitioners respectfully pray that this Honorable Court approve the said bond, and that the said irrigation district be organized under said laws, and be designated by the name of ONTARIO-NYSSA IRRIGATION DISTRICT, and that the boundaries thereof be defined and established by Order of this Court, and that the Court appoint proper and necessary officers to conduct an election within said proposed district, and that the time and place for holding said election for the purpose of determining whether said district shall be organized, and for the election of directors thereof, be fixed by Order of this Court, and that the Court make such other and further orders as may be just and proper under this petition and under the irrigation district laws of Oregon.
