In the Matter of the Organization of the Ontario-Nyssa Irrigation District.

NOTICE OF ELECTION.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: Notice is hereby given that on the 7th day of September, 1926, there will be held an election for the purpose of determining whether or not an irrigation district shall be organized under the provisions of Chapter 14, Title XLI, of the General Laws of Oregon and laws supplementary thereto and amendatory thereof, for the purpose of contracting with the United States for the construction of the Owyhee project to furnish gravity water to the lands in said proposed district.

That the name of said proposed irrigation district is the ONTARIO-NYSSA IRRIGATION DISTRICT.

That at said election the qualified electors of said proposed district, the boundaries of which are hereinafter defined, shall be required to cast ballots which shall contain the words: "ONTARIO-NYSSA IRRIGATION DISTRICT—YES" and "ONTARIO-NYSSA IRRIGATION DISTRICT—NO."

That the boundaries of said proposed irrigation district are described as follows, to-wit:

Commencing at the point where the mid-channel of the Owyhee Canal belonging to the Owyhee Ditch Company, a corporation, as now constructed upon the ground, intersects the section line between sections Twenty-three (23) and Twenty-four (24), in Township Twenty (20) South, Range Forty-six (46) East, W. M., said point being at or near the quarter section corner on the West line of said Section Twenty-four (24), and extending thence in a general northerly direction along the mid-channel of said Owyhee Canal as now constructed, through Township Twenty (20) South, Range Forty-six (46) East, to the point where the mid-channel of said Owyhee Canal intersects the north line of Section Twenty-four (24), Township Eighteen (18) South, Range Forty-six (46) East, at or near the quarter section corner on the North line of said Section Twenty-four (24); thence West along the North line of said Section Twenty-four (24) and Section Twenty-three (23), to the northwest corner of section Twenty-three (23) in said township and range; thence South along the West line of said Section Twenty-three (23), to the point where said line intersects the mid-channel of the ditch known as the Nevada Ditch, belonging to the Warm Springs Irrigation District, as now constructed on the ground; thence westerly along the mid-channel of said Nevada Ditch to the point where said ditch intersects the West line of Section Twenty-two (22), Township Eighteen (18) South, Range Forty-six (46) East, W. M.; thence South along the West line of said Section Twenty-two (22), to the point where the said section line intersects the mid-channel of the ditch known as the Ontario-Nyssa Canal, belonging to the Ontario-Nyssa Irrigation Company, a corporation, at or near the northwest corner of the Southwest Quarter of the Southwest Quarter (SW 1/4 SW 1/4) of said Section Twenty-two (22), Township Eighteen (18) South, Range Forty-six (46) East, W. M., thence in a general easterly and southerly direction, following along the mid-channel of said Ontario-Nyssa Canal, to the point where the pipe line of said Ontario-Nyssa Irrigation Company empties into said canal, on the east and west center line of Section Fourteen (14), Township Twenty (20) South, Range Forty-six (46) East, W. M.; thence continuing southerly along the mid-channel of the ditch of said Ontario-Nyssa Irrigation Company to the point where the same intersects the south line of said section Fourteen (14); thence East along the South line of said Section Fourteen (14), to the southeast corner thereof; thence South along the West line of Section Twenty-four (24), to the point where said line intersects the mid-channel of the Owyhee Canal, at or near the quarter section corner on the West line of said Section Twenty-four (24), Township Twenty (20) South, Range Forty-six (46) East, W. M., the place of beginning.

That at said election to determine whether or not the said proposed irrigation district shall be organized three directors who shall be residents of the State of Oregon and bona fide owners of land situated within said proposed District shall be elected to serve as a Board of Directors for said District. That said District shall not be divided into divisions but shall constitute but one election precinct and the said Directors shall be elected at large from among the land owners therein.

And you are hereby further notified that the place for said election has been fixed by order of the County Court for Malheur County, Oregon at the residence of Jno. A. Hunt in the NW 1/4 of Section 7, Township 19 South, Range 47 E. W. M.

This notice is given pursuant to an order of the County Court of Malheur County, Oregon, made and entered at a regular session thereof on the 4th day of August, 1926, which Order determined that the petition of Deseret Sheep Company, and others, praying for the organization of said proposed district contained the requisite number of signers under the laws of Oregon; that said petition and notice of intention to present the same had been published as by law required and wherein the said Court accepted and approved the bond of petitioners. And said Order further defined the boundaries of said district as hereinabove set forth and determined that the lands within the said boundaries are susceptible of irrigation from the same source and from the same system of work and from the proposed Owyhee project and called an election to be held on the said 7th day of September, 1926, to determine whether said proposed district should be organized and to elect three directors thereof.

Said Order further directed that notice of said election be given by publication as by law required.
