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Holding for \$10 a Ton

A news item in the Idaho Statesman of September 23 states that haygrowers of southern Idaho have decided \$10 a ton is a fair price for this year's crop, and most of them are holding for that figure. Sheepmen and haygrowers, meeting recently at Grand

view, confirmed this view, with only two voices raised for a lower figure. These watching the situation point out that there will be as many sheep to eat the hay this year as last, while there is a shortage of hay all over the United States.

"Growers will ship out of the state rather than take less than \$10 this year," said one grower, "and I am confident they can do that well by shipping."

The demand of the Idaho haygrowers for \$10 a ton should strengthen the fight of local growers for a fair price for their hay. Prices offered so far range around \$7 per ton, which is little, if any, above the cost of production. Competent judges state that sheepmen can afford to feed \$10 a ton, or even higher, under present prices for wool and lambs and still make a good profit. It would seem to be a mistake policy, even from the sheepmen's standpoint, to force haygrowers to sell at a loss, as it will result in their going into other lines of farming, making hay scarce and high.

The Democrats believe that they have a ticket which is deserving of the consideration of the voters, and will put forth every effort to acquaint the voters with the merits of their candidates.

Ontario Nyssa Irrigation District

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a special election will be held on the 9th day of November, 1926, at the residence of John A. Hunt, known as the Chet Lackey place, within the Ontario Nyssa Irrigation District in Malheur County, Oregon, at which there will be submitted to the electors of said district the question whether the said District shall be authorized to enter into contract with the United States, providing for the construction of the Owyhee Project by the United States and for the payment of a proportionate part of the cost to be determined as in said contract provided, and the total construction obligation of the District not to exceed the sum of \$850,000.

A copy of the draft of said proposed contract, approved as to form by the Secretary of Interior, is on file with the Secretary of the District and may be examined by any person interested.

The polls shall be opened at 8 o'clock on the morning of the day of election and kept open until 5 o'clock in the afternoon, when the same shall be closed.

At such election the ballot shall contain the words—"Contract with the United States Yes," and "Contract with the United States—No."

Said election shall be held and the results thereof determined in all respects as nearly as practicable in conformity with the provisions of law governing the election of irrigation district officers.

NOTICE OF ELECTION.

IN THE COUNTY COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, FOR THE COUNTY OF MALHEUR,

In the Matter of the Organization of the KINGMAN COLONY IRRIGATION DISTRICT.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Notice is hereby given that on the 5th day of October, 1926, there will be held an election for the purpose of determining whether or not an irrigation district shall be organized under the provisions of Chapter 14, Title XLI, of the General Laws of Oregon and laws supplementary thereto and amendatory thereof, for the purpose of contracting with the United States for the construction of the Owyhee project to furnish gravity water to the lands in said proposed district.

That the name of said proposed irrigation district is the "KINGMAN COLONY IRRIGATION DISTRICT."

That at said election the qualified electors of said proposed district, the boundaries of which are hereinafter defined, shall be required to cast ballots which shall contain the words: "KINGMAN COLONY IRRIGATION DISTRICT—YES" and "KINGMAN COLONY IRRIGATION DISTRICT—NO."

That the boundaries of said proposed irrigation district are described as follows, to-wit:

Commencing at a point in Lot Two (2) of Section Six (6), Township Twenty-one (21) South, Range Forty-Seven (47) East of the Willamette Meridian where the mid channel of the Kingman Colony Drainage District's main drainage canal, as said canal is now constructed, intersects with the west meander line of Snake river; thence in a westerly direction along the mid channel of said main drainage canal to the west boundary line of said section six, thence south along the west boundary line of said section six (6) to the west corner of said section six (6); thence west along the east and west center line of said section One (1), Township Twenty-one (21) South, Range Forty-six (46) East of the Willamette Meridian to the mid-channel of said main drainage canal; thence in a northerly direction

along the mid-channel of said main drainage canal to a point where the mid-channel of said main drainage canal intersects with the Overstreet branch thereof; thence in a westerly and southerly direction along the mid-channel of the Overstreet branch of said Kingman Colony Drainage District's main drainage canal to a point where said Overstreet branch of said main drainage canal intersects with the east and west center line of said section One (1); thence west to a point on the east and west center line of said section One (1) and section Two (2) in Township Twenty-one (21) South, Range Forty-six (46) East of the Willamette Meridian where said east and west center line of said section One (1) and Two (2) intersects with the mid-channel of the Kingman Colony Irrigation Company's 52 foot irrigation ditch as the same is now located and laid out; thence in a southerly direction along the mid-channel of said

Kingman Colony Irrigation Company's 52 foot irrigation ditch to a point where said Kingman Colony Irrigation Company's 52 foot irrigation ditch intersects the south section line of said section Two (2); thence west along said south section line of said section Two (2) to the south quarter corner of said

Section Two (2); thence south to the southwest corner of the northwest quarter of the northeast quarter (NW1/4) of section Eleven (11) Township Twenty-one (21) South, Range Forty-six (46) East of the Willamette Meridian; thence west to the northwest corner of the southwest quarter of the northwest quarter (SW1/4) of said section Eleven (11); thence south to the west quarter corner of said section Eleven (11); thence west to the northwest corner of the northeast quarter of the southeast quarter (SE1/4) of said section Ten (10); Township Twenty-one (21) South, Range Forty-six (46) East of the Willamette Meridian; thence south to the southwest corner of the southeast quarter of the southeast quarter (SE1/4) of said section Ten (10); thence east to the southwest corner of the southeast quarter of the southeast quarter (SE1/4) of said section Eleven (11); thence east to the southeast corner of the northeast quarter of the southwest quarter (NE1/4) of said section Eleven (11); thence north to the center of said section Eleven (11); thence east to a point where the center line of said section Eleven (11) intersects with the mid-channel of said Kingman Colony Irrigation Company's 52 foot irrigation ditch; thence in a general easterly direction along the mid channel of said Kingman Colony Irrigation Company's 52 foot irrigation ditch to the east terminus thereof; thence on a line directly east to a point where said line intersects with the west meander line of Snake river; thence in a northerly direction along the west meander line of said Snake river to the place of beginning.

That at said election to determine whether or not the said proposed irrigation district shall be organized, three directors who shall be residents of the state of Oregon and bona fide owners of land situated within said proposed district, shall be elected to serve as a Board of Directors for said district. That said district shall not be divided into divisions but shall constitute but one election precinct, and the said directors shall be elected at large from among the land owners therein.

And you are hereby further notified that the place for said election has been fixed by order of the County Court for Malheur County, Oregon, as the school house in school District No. 61, in Malheur County, Oregon.

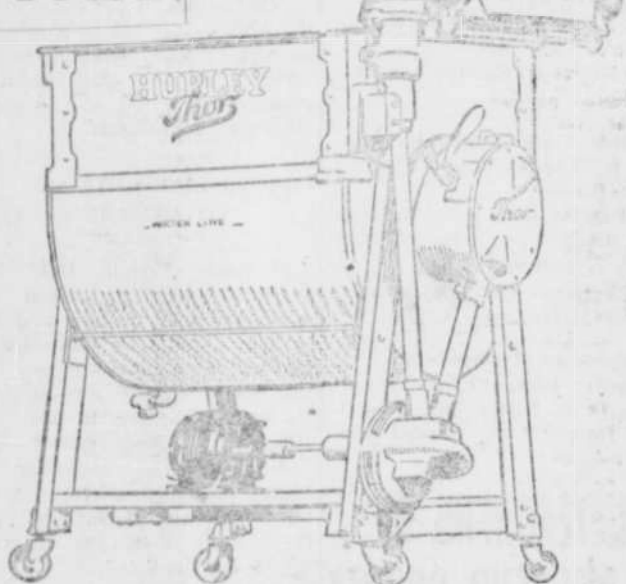
This notice is given pursuant to an order of the County Court of Malheur County, Oregon, made and entered at a regular session thereof on the first day of September, 1926, which order determined that the petition of E. J. Barrough, and nineteen others, praying for the organization of said proposed district contained the requisite number of signers under the laws of Oregon; that said petition and notice of intention to present the same had been published as by law required, and wherein the said Court accepted and approved the bond of petitioners. And said order further defined the boundaries of said district as hereinabove set forth and determined. That the lands within said boundaries are susceptible of irrigation from the same source and from the same system of works and from the proposed Owyhee project, and called an election to be held on the 5th day of October, 1926, to determine whether said proposed district shall be organized and to elect three directors thereof.

said order further directed that notice of said election be given by publication, as by law required.
