Big Wool Sale

Pool of 600,000 Pounds Sold to
Eastern Buyers Through
Malheur Co. Bank.

The sale of 600,000 lbs of Malheur county wool was consummated today, the Malheur County Bank handing the deal for a pool of over 20 woolgrowers, which includes most of the prominent growers of the county. The price received was 36c net at Portland, equal to about 35c here. This is considered a good price, as a number of earlier sales were made at several cents less. The wool was of superior quality and brought top price.

This sale about cleans up the wool supply of the county, little marketable wool being left. The Malheur County Bank had previously sold 200,000 lbs, making 800,000 lbs for this one institution.
