

To the Voters of Malheur County:

Can You Afford to Vote for Frederick Steiwer for United States Senator?

- (1) He is reported by the New York Times as opposed to the McNary Haugen bill,
- (2) At the Muddy Creek Fair at Baker, Oregon, on September 7, Mr. Steiwer advocated "hard work" as a means of success in agriculture.
- (3) Mr. Steiwer, in 1924, in a printed statement, referred to Portland as an "inferior" port to Seattle,
- (4) Pendleton dispatches state that in 1925 Steiwer appeared before the Bankers Association and urged the support of the Dennis Resolution prohibiting inheritance and income taxes in Oregon until 1940. This would increase our state taxes \$500,000 in loss of inheritance tax alone.
- (5) Mr. Steiwer has never stated that he would oppose the seating of Senators who acquired their election by the excessive use of campaign expenditures.

Senator McNary has never directly advocated the election of Steiwer.
