Monthly Report of Egg Laying Contest

Below we give a partial report for September of the California Farm Bureau Egg Laying Contest at Santa Cruz under the auspices of the College of Agriculture, poultry division. To compare their own returns by the W. Gibson, a former Nyssa boy, is the expert in charge of the contest and has about 600 high bred birds from all over the United States in his care. His report will be of interest to local poultry raisers by allowing them to compare their own returns by the results obtained by purebred stock under expert care.

The average production for all breeds for September (27 days) was 57.5 per cent, the highest September lay this contest has ever had, and a slight increase over last month; also an increase of 18.8 per cent over the corresponding month of last year's contest. The average production for the 12 months (360 days) was 54.4 per cent, a slight increase of 2.7 per cent over last year's 12 months average.
