IN MEMORY OF MRS. PINKSTON

Thou Hast All Seasons for Thine Own, O Death!

The Owyhee community was saddened by the visit of the death messenger that called for our loved friend and neighbor, Mrs. Harriet Pinkston, in the home of her daughter, Mrs. Wm. Smith, on February 5, 1927, with whom she had lived since the death of her husband on February 2, 1922.

Harriet Jane Vaughn was born in Butler county, Missouri, November 5, 1860. She was married to Jas. S. Pinkston, a Civil war veteran, in Poplar Bluffs, Mo., on February 19, 1868. She was the mother of eight children, three of whom died in infancy. Four of the remaining five were with her in her last illness—Mrs. Wm. Smith, Mrs. Andrew McGinnis and Oscar and Walter Pinkston. Mrs. Sam Watson of Los Angeles, Cal., was unable to reach here. There are also fifteen grandchildren and seven great grandchildren to mourn the loss of the gentle, patient Christian woman, whose mild life and tender words were never failing to point the way to goodness of daily work and praise for the Master.

Rev. Olney Kendall of the Methodist church in Burley, Idaho, came to conduct the funeral services. The words selected from which to speak were "Be Thou Faithful Unto Death and I Will Give Thee a Crown of Life." He also offered a loving tribute to her in whose home he had lived a time when he was but a young man beginning his work in the ministry. A time when his sincere Christian daily life, a pioneer woman of Long Valley, Idaho, meant so much to him, as well as to all with whom she lived and worked.

The Pinkstons came from Long Valley back to Owyhee community 22 years ago and this minister was given the Methodist circuit of Ontario and Nyssa, so again he and Mrs. Pinkston were associated together and a help to each other, so it was fitting that this minister should be the one to speak for her.

Mr. Russell, an old time neighbor who has been intimately associated with the family for 42 years, was also in attendance.

We who have known Mrs. Pinkston, of her faithful life as a pioneer in Owyhee, which was not easy nor always free from danger. Much care and many physical hardships lay all along her pathway, but faithful, devoted and loyal, she was ever true to her Christian belief and her quiet words staunch in witnessing for the Savior gave strength to those who were stumbling, gave hope to those who were weak.

Dear kind neighbor and friend we say "goodby" to your frail body, but you are alive to all who knew you and experienced the joy of your sweet example and influence.

God in His wisdom has recalled
The boon His love has given,

The soul is safe in heaven.

REVIEW OF WORK OF
OREGON LEGISLATUREIncome Tax and Tithing Meas-
ures Sponsored by Gov-
ernor Patterson.

Tithing Bill. Hits Game and Highway
Funds—Require Schools to Teach
160 Days—Pneumatic Tires for All
Trucks Proposed—Congress Mem-
orized to Protect Crops.

Salem.—As a result of Governor
Patterson's message to the legislature
last week outlining his plan for solv-
ing the state's financial difficulties
practically all revenue bills have been
sidetracked and attention centered on
the revenue bills sponsored by the
governor.

In his message the governor sug-
gested an income tax with a graduat-
ed rate, the maximum not to exceed
3 per cent. To meet the present
emergency until an income tax can
operate he advised that 5 per cent be
taken from the revenues of self-sus-
taining boards and commissions dur-
ing 1927 and thereafter 2½ per cent.

When the legislature assembled
Monday bills to carry out the gover-
nor's ideas were ready for attention.
The income tax bill provides exemp-
tions of \$1,000 for single, and \$2,000
for married persons and corporations
and \$400 for each dependent, with a
graduated schedule from one to three
per cent. The measure is to be re-
ferred to the people at a special elec-
tion this year. The bill is expected
to raise \$2,000,000.

Income Tax Reaction Favorable
Generally speaking, the reaction to
the income tax recommendation is
favorable among the members both of
senate and house.

Under the tithing bill, which levies
5 per cent on the revenues of state
boards and commissions during 1927
and 2½ per cent thereafter, it is be-
lieved that the fish and game funds
and the highway funds would contrib-
ute most of the income of \$1,000,000
fixed by Secretary of State Koser as
the probable charge during 1927 and
1928. There will undoubtedly be some
objection among highway enthusiasts
over the prospect of using highway
money for general state purposes.

Some members fear the proposed
tithing tax, as far as the highway de-
partment was concerned, might result
disastrously, as the greater part of
the highway funds already were obli-
gated for new construction, and for
that reason, virtually the entire 5 per
cent tax, as it affected the highway
department, would fall upon that por-
tion of the receipts available for new
construction.

Building Program Totals \$2,200,000
The building program of the state
of Oregon for the current biennium,
as far as approved by the joint ways
and means committee, aggregates \$2,
200,000. This figure does not include
a number of other proposed improve-
ments such as additions to existing
state buildings and necessary repairs.

The number of holidays that may be
celebrated by schools of the state
would be limited by Representative
Paulson's bill, which requires that all
public schools throughout the state
shall hold at least eight months of
classes and must teach 160 days ex-
clusive of holidays.

All lands registered under the Tor-
rens land act are restored to the reg-
ular method of recording titles, under
provisions of a house bill introduced
by Representative Clark. The bill
provides that all recorders of deeds
are directed, without payment of any
fees therefor, to proceed immediately
to record in the regular deed and
mortgages records all deeds, leases
which do not appear to have expired,
all mortgages not fully released, and
assignments and partial releases there-
of and other instruments in their of-
fices registered under the provisions
of the Torrens act.

Portland State Building Proposed
A state office building for Portland
to cost \$600,000, and to be a substitute
for the proposed structure of the same
cost provided for at Salem in another
bill. It is the object of a house bill in-
troduced by Loneragan, Rushlight and
Olson. It is proposed that the build-
ing be financed by borrowed funds
from the industrial accident commis-
sion's reserve.

Fearing there might be the result
of harming the highway program
wrapped up in Senator Eddy's bill to
relieve counties of a share of the cost
of constructing highway crossings
over railway lines, the house recalled
it from the senate, after having passed
it.

As is done at practically every leg-
islative session a committee made up
of house and senate members will con-
fer with a like committee from the
Washington legislature relative to fish-
ing rights on the Columbia river be-
tween the two states.

The secretary of agriculture, under
a memorial introduced by Senator
Miller and adopted by the senate,
would take steps to have the state of
California complete unfinished federal
