HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To save a double-boiler from boiling
dry, put a small baking powder can or
a jelly glass into the lower part of the
boiler. When the water reaches the
can it is set in motion and tinkles against
the bottom of the boiler. It makes a
good alarm clock and warns you to add
water to the boiler.

If you have put too much salt in the
meat stew or soup, add a raw potato,
which as it cooks will absorb some of
the extra salt.

Parsley will keep fresh several days
if it is washed in cold water, placed in
a glass jar with a tight cover and put
in the ice box.

Transfer all small package goods
such as soda, baking powder ginger and
mustard into empty glass jars, and
your shelves will be neater. Also you
can tell at a glance how large your
stock is. Adhesive tape may be used
for the labels. Cover the labels with
colorless shellac and the jars may be
washed without harming the label.

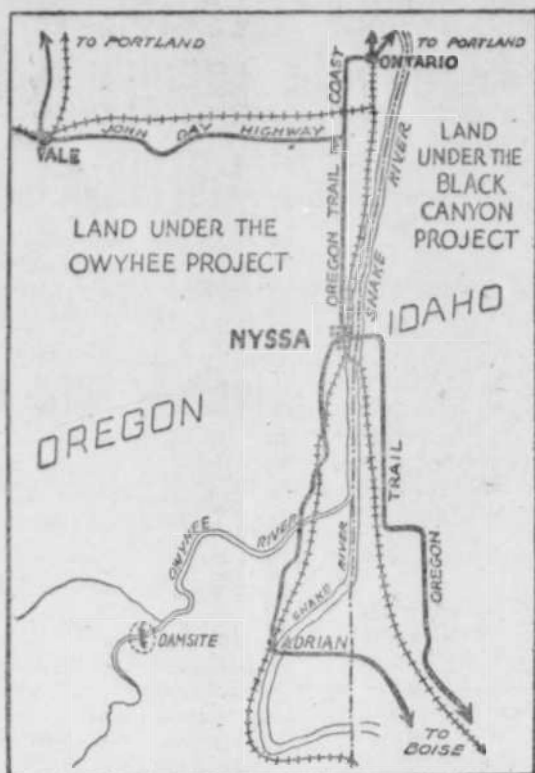

OWYHEE PROJECT

Consisting Of \$140,000 Acres of Fertile Land to Be Irrigated by
the Government at a Cost of \$18,000,000—Will Take Five
Years to Complete the Project.



Considerable activity is being
manifested at the damsite.
Chief Engineer Banks and
associates passed through Nyssa
Saturday on a tour of inspection.
The following information regard-
ing Nyssa and the Owyhee
project may prove interesting to
homeseekers:

Nyssa, Oregon, with an esti-
mated population of 900, is lo-
cated at an elevation of 2100
feet, in the extreme east central
part of the state and is the point
of entry to the state of the Union
Pacific railroad and the Oregon
Trail highway. It is also the
junction of the proposed water
grade cutoff on the west side of
Snake river, which already ex-
tends 35 miles through a rich
agricultural district extending
to Homedale and Pickle Butte.

Nyssa is the gateway to one
of the greatest reclamation pro-
ject ever undertaken by the
government—the Owyhee Pro-
ject. When completed, at a
cost of \$18,000, the huge dam,
30 miles southwest of Nyssa,
rising to a height of 375 feet,
will impound 600,000 acre feet
of water, amply sufficient to
water the 139,560 acres of fertile
lands stretching for 85 miles
along the west bank of Snake
river, which has aptly been
compared to the Nile river in
Egypt on account of the great
value to the country through
which it runs.

Crop statistics prove this to
be one of the most fertile sec-
tions in the United States,
capable of great diversification
and ample returns. Everything
that is grown in a temperate
zone is produced here in great
abundance. Nyssa farms have
produced as high as 25 tons of
corn ensilage per acre; 100
bushels of corn per acre; 65
bushels of wheat per acre; 600
bushels of potatoes per acre;
100 bushels of oats per acre; 10
tons of alfalfa per acre; Head
lettuce grows to perfection and
is a heavy producer.

Electric lighting system.
Two municipal waterworks

THE OWYHEE PROJECT

The dam will be built at the
"Hole in the Ground" some 30
miles southwest of Nyssa. This
dam, compared with the Arrow-
rock in volume, will be somewhat
higher in elevation and approxi-
mately the same in cost
(\$6,111,815). The reservoir will
have a capacity of 600,000 acre
feet, compared with about
200,000 for the Arrowrock dam.
A part of this water will be
diverted in a three and one-half
mile tunnel approximately fifteen
and one half feet in diameter, at
the end of which a six and one
third mile tunnel, 10 feet in
diameter, will take it to the Gem
district in Idaho. The balance
of the water from the first
tunnel will be carried down
the Owyhee river, siphoned
across the river with a 300
foot head and carried to the
lands above Ontario and Nyssa,
siphoned again across the
Malheur river, two and one half
miles under a 250 foot head and
taken down to the lands on the
Dead Ox Flat, extending almost
to Weiser.
