PROTEST AGAINST VALE LAND OFFICE CLOSING

Nyssa Commercial Club Passes Resolutions Protesting Proposed Closing of Vale Land Office.

The following resolutions were drawn up and mailed to Commissioner Spry of Washington, D. C. by the Nyssa Commercial Club in protest to the closing of the land office at Vale, Oregon:

Whereas, the Department of the Interior has announced its intention of closing the U. S. Land Office at Vale, Oregon and,

Whereas, the Nyssa Commercial Club believes that this would be a costly mistake on the part of the Department, entailing great hardship and expense to the entrymen,

Therefore, we earnestly protest against closing said Land Office at Vale for the following reasons:

1st.—The area tributary to this office embraces over 8,000,000 acres of land acres of land subject to entry, covering 62% of all public lands in Oregon.

2nd.—The Government has started a \$20,000,000 irrigation project in the heart of this district, which will result in renewed interest in our public lands.

3rd.—The nearest land office to this land would be from 350 to 500 miles distant, making the expense of filing and proving up almost prohibitive.

4th.—The Vale Land Office is paying the cost of administration and in addition is paying several thousand dollars annually into the U. S. treasury. Its closing would not be in the interest of economy.

5th.—It is unjust that the Western part of the state, where public land is very limited, should have two land offices while the Eastern part, which contains the bulk of the public area should have none.

In view of these facts and many others that might be cited, we earnestly request that you reconsider your determination to close this office.
