Notice is hereby given, that at a meeting held at the council rooms in the town of Nyssa, Malheur County, Oregon, on the 25th day of May, 1927, a resolution was passed by the council of said Town of Nyssa and approved by the Mayor, which said resolution provided for the proposed improvements and the intention of the council to make certain improvements as follows:

The extension of the sidewalks on each side of main street, between the West line of the right of way of the Oregon Short Line Railroad Company and Third street to a width of ten feet, and building and constructing a gutter and curbing thereon at the outer edge of said sidewalk when so extended; and building and constructing a gutter and curbing at the outer edge of the sidewalks on First street between Bower Avenue and Good Avenue. The estimated costs of such proposed improvement is Twenty cents a square foot for the extension of said sidewalk, and One Dollar per lineal foot for the building and constructing said curbing; the manner of apportioning the costs of such improvement and levying the assessment and taxes therefor to be levied and assessed against and a tax upon the property fronting or abutting up on said streets, that said proposed improvement to be made according to the plans and specifications now on file with the recorder of said Town of Nyssa, where said plans and specifications may be examined by any and all interested persons.
