FIRE DOES DAMAGE AT TOM LOWE RANCH

A fire of unknown origin caused considerable damage at the Tom Lowe ranch on the Owyhee Thursday, completely destroying the horse barn, cow barn, chicken house, granary and three hay stacks before the flames were brought under control. The damage is estimated at \$2500, which is a total loss to Mr. Lowe, nothing having been insured.

ACCIDENT FATAL TO F. L. ALLRED

The sad news was received here last week of the death of Francis Lemar Allred, youngest brother of Mrs. Geo. Green, of Nyssa.

Mr. Allred was killed May 31st, at Lewiston, Idaho while employed by the Hunt, Mirk Company engaged in installing the boilers in the Clearwater Timber Co's. Power house. He was struck by a swinging sheet of iron which was being hoisted higher in the building, throwing him about 20 feet from a scaffold, being hit in such a manner as to throw him backwards striking his head on a pile of iron. He suffered a basal skull fracture being rendered unconscious the unfortunate man dying five minutes after reaching the hospital and about thirty minutes after the fatal fall.

He leaves his widow and three little children, six sisters, four brothers and a host of other relatives and friends to mourn his tragic death. He was 39 years old.

Mr. Allred will be remembered by the older settlers of Nyssa having been here through the haying and fruit seasons several years. He was also an ex-soldier of the late war.

Funeral services were held in Boise Sunday from the L. D. S. church building in the Morris Hill cemetery.

TUESDAY NIGHT WIND DOES DAMAGE

Nyssa experienced a real wind storm Tuesday night followed by a heavy rain which lasted throughout the night. Trees were blown down and many branches broken while the greatest damage in evidence was a broken window in the Nyssa Packing Co's store on Main St., the entire large plate glass window being shattered by the awning rods which were blown loose. From the surrounding country reports came of silo's chicken houses and light structures being blown down.

This is a very unusual happening for this section of the country.
