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LINDBERGH'S TRIUMPH

Seldom has it fallen to the lot of any person in peace
time to receive such a measure of world-wide acclaim as
has been accorded Captain Charles Lindbergh, lone hero
of the New York to Paris flight.

As a feat of sheer daring and skill Lindbergh's achiev-
ement has never been surpassed by any airman since the
Wright Brothers flew their first frail craft at Kitty
Hawk.

True, he was lucky in his brave flight. But luck alone
would not have sufficed to conquer the tremendous odds
against him. Without the consummate mastery of naviga-
tion which he displayed, the element of luck important
as it was, would never have enabled him to reach Paris.
The accuracy with which he flew his course from New-
foundland to the Irish coast was a marvelous perform-
ance, which can be fully appreciated only by one who
understands the difficulty of navigating a great circle
course without the aid of astronomical observations.

The honors showered upon this 25-year-old knight of
the air by the people of France, including the Legion of
Honor insignia pinned upon his breast by President
Dumergue, were almost unprecedented. The
demonstration accorded him was spontaneous and sin-
cere, in spite of the national sorrow of the French over
the fate of their own gallant Nungesser and Coli, who
only a few days before in their attempt to make a similar
flight perished, how and where the world may never
know.

Today Lindbergh holds the undisputed title of the
world's greatest aviator. He is the first to cross the
Atlantic alone in an airplane. He established a new
world's nonstop straight line distance record, flying 3,600
miles in 33 1/2 hours. Every true American has been
thrilled with pride in his epoch-making performance.

GENERAL ANDREWS RESIGNS

Announcement has been made of the resignation of
General Lincoln C. Andrews as assistant secretary of the
treasury and head of the prohibition enforcement branch
of the government. He will be succeeded by Seymour
Lowman, former lieutenant governor of New York, but
under the new law the prohibition enforcement bureau
will be under Dr. J. M. Doran as commissioner, who will
succeed Roy Asa Haynes in that office.

During his service in his present capacity, which will
terminate in August 1, General Andrews has shown
great executive ability and energy in his efforts to en-
force the Volstead Act. That he has been confronted with
a tremendous task is evident to all. In view of all cir-
cumstances, the wonder is, not that prohibition has been
imperfectly enforced, but that it has been enforced as
well as it has.

A leading "dry" recently admitted that it might take
25 years to attain a satisfactory measure of enforcement,
and many will agree with the forecast, however much
more speedy results may be desired.

There has been some criticism of General Andrews
because it was known that before he accepted his present
office he was not a total abstainer. But he pledged him-
self to total abstinence while on this duty and it can not
be denied that he has been faithful to his trust. He will
leave the service with a clean and creditable record.

NEWTON'S HUMILITY

Celebration of the 200th anniversary of the death of
Sir Isaac Newton recently held in England recalled many
personal anecdotes of the great natural philosopher. In
spite of his towering genius and scientific attainments,
Newton was one of the most humble of men.

As a boy he confessed that he was "far" from indus-
trious and stood very low in his class. In fact it appears
that in his earlier years he had what would be called to-
day an "inferiority complex;" he lacked confidence in
himself. The turning point in his career is said to have
been when he mustered courage to whip a larger boy who
had attacked him without provocation. This success
seems to have led him to grater exertions and he became
head boy in his school.

Late in life, after he had given to the world the results
of his monumental labors, Newton said:

"I do not know how I may appear to the world, but to
myself I seem to have been only like a boy playing on the
seashore, now and then finding a smoother pebble or a
prettier shell than before, while the great ocean of truth
lay all undiscovered before me.

No finer illustration of the humility which usually
accompanies true greatness can be found than that.
