## HEAVY RAIN STORM HITS NYSSA SUNDAY

Nyssa experienced one of the wettest storms of the season, Sunday afternoon when a rain driven by a strong west wind started at two o'clock and fell for thirty minutes, giving the town and surrounding country a real soaking.

The storm came just as the crowd were gathering at the ball park to witness the final game between the Nyssa and New Plymouth teams, and those who were not fortunate enough to be in closed cars got a thorough drenching. Several parties of picnickers were forced to return home earlier than had been planned over roads in some places, none too dry.

With the exception of some damage to hay which had not been stacked, the farmers profited generally by the storm it is believed.
