1 egg
1 t salt
2 t honey
1 t mustard
2 t vinegar
6 t lemon juice
1½ c salad oil
Paprika
1 t mustard
2 t vinegar

Put all ingredients except half of vinegar, lemon and oil into a bowl and beat. Add one c oil slowly, beating thoroughly. Add remainder of vinegar and then lemon juice and the rest of the oil.

POTATO EGG SALAD

4 c sliced potato
1 c sliced celery or lettuce
2 hard boiled eggs
1 t lemon juice
½ c honey mayonnaise
½ c condensed milk
Mix carefully, chill for 30 min. Garnish with egg and pimento. Tomatoes and cream cheese.

SANDWICHES

Spread thin slices of bread with butter. On half of slices spread cream cheese; on second slices put thin slices of tomato, cover with a little honey mayonnaise. Press together, cut and serve.
