CONSULTING ENGINEERS TO MAKE INSPECTION

Saturday is the day scheduled for the arrival of the consulting engineers who with F. A. Banks, construction engineer at the Owyhee dam-site will make a detailed inspection of conditions for final facts and figures in regard to this gigantic construction. The following account from Washington imparts authentic moves to be taken: "Final studies in the design and site of the Owyhee dam, to impound waters for the Owyhee reclamation project, pre to be made by a board of three engineers, whose appointment was announced by the interior department. The members are A. J. Wiley, Boise D. C. Henny, Portland, and W. H. Nalder of the reclamation office at Denver. They will be assisted by F. A. Banks, construction engineer, while Dr. Warren H. Smith of Eugene, geologist, has been chosen to advise upon geological conditions disclosed by recent drilling.

Owyhee dam is to be 11 feet higher than Arrowrock dam, in Idaho, now the world's highest, and will have a total height of 360 feet. It will attract attention among engineers the world over, and the preliminaries are to be considered with great care. First will be the question of suitability of the site and foundation conditions shown by the drilling and geological reports. Additional drilling is expected to be required before final designs are prepared. The location will be considered with reference to future development of power and a choice made between the arch dam and gravity dam. Strusses will be considered and the sources of concrete and other material discussed, with a view to selection of the best suited by quality, transportation and construction conditions.

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NEW TRAFFIC SIGNALS INSTALLED THIS WEEK

New Stop traffic signals have recently been installed at the cross roads leading on to the highway, meaning that cars must come to a complete stop before coming on the main thoroughfare. It is to be hoped that these signals are observed without force for a very rigid enforcement of these rules will be carried out.
