DOLLARS DO NOT GROW ON TREES

The manner in which taxes are mounting and the
staggering burdens they are putting upon all the people
should give concern to every individual who has any in-
terest in the future of Our Country. It seems to be
easy to incur obligations and get into debt and corres-
pondingly difficult to curtail extravagance and get free
from our bond, warrant and interest burdens.

While federal taxes have been reduced by hundreds
of millions since 1921, state and local taxes have risen
twice as fast as federal taxes have been reduced. Local
taxes of municipalities and districts of one sort and an-
other, which are organized on various pretexts for the
purpose of levying some new form of tax, are responsi-
ble for the orgy we are passing through.

Every tax dollar comes from the pockets of the peo-

wasted or spent unnecessarily is a dollar of capital des-
troyed. It has ceased earning, developing and produc-
ing.

Business and property cannot forever endure this in-
creasing drain, this steady confiscation of capital.

RISE OF RURAL PRESS

The most remarkable feature of American journalism
is the growth, development and influence of the country
weekly newspaper and small town daily. Fifteen to
twenty-five years ago practically all of these represen-
tatives of the smaller cities and towns consisted of
poorly printed sheets of local items and boiler plate. To-
day look at them. The great majority are clearly print-
ed; they carry a certain amount of the more important
national and international news along with the strictly
local columns; they are filled with advertising; most
importantly they have editorial columns.

Above all this last cannot be exaggerated. From
mere reporters of town happenings, they have risen to
an important, possibly the most important place as lead-
ers of thought and comment on local, state and national
problems. Their opinions are usually well founded and
intelligent. They sway politics, industrial and business
progress, and national affairs in a large way.

It would be well for the average citizen to better ap-
preciate the character and influence of the rural press.
It may give him another slant on the reason for Amer-
ica's unprecedented progress.
