ENGINEERS VISIT OWYHEE DAMSITE

Report on Final Location of Dam Design, Material. Utah Construction Co. Investigating.

Reports from the Owyhee district office in regards to the signing of contracts are that this week has shown a marked increase in the number of signers, which is indeed encouraging.

Geo. C. Kreutzer, director of reclamation economics will arrive August 23rd and will be here four days checking over the contracts and to also talk over line settlement with the board of directors of the Owyhee District.

During this week engineers A. J. Wiley, of Boise, D. C. Henny, of Portland, and W. H. Nalder of Denver, together with Dr. Warren Duprey Smith of the University of Oregon and F. A. Banks spent three days at the damsite making a detailed examination as to determine final location of dam, design material to be used and all necessary information which is needed to make their final report to the reclamation board.

Last week representatives from the Utah Construction Company were here going over the ground to estimate the cost of the construction of the proposed railroad to be built to the damsite with the idea of bidding on same when the bids are open Aug. 16th at Boise.

Everything is developing as it should and it will only be but awhile longer until we will witness the largest piece of construction work ever undertaken by the reclamation bringing with it prosperity and plenty to Malheur County.

ESCAPE FROM JAIL BUT ARE OVERTAKEN

FRESH COFFEE SERVICE COMES TO NYSSA

Nyssa is to have the very latest in coffee service according to the plans of Seckel, Fritchman & Co. of Boise, coffee roasters. The plan provides regular scheduled truck service with the coffee fresh from the roasting ovens which will be delivered to local merchants who have arranged to distribute it to the consumer. It is claimed for the new service, that it practically eliminates the cost of expensive containers, because the product of the Boise house which is sold under the Oregon Trail Brand can be packed for quick service in an inexpensive container.

"This is the plan followed in the larger cities by many roasters who have found that the consuming public is quick to appreciate the extra quality in freshly roasted coffee," said Mr. Larson, president of the company who was in town to complete arrangements with local dealers.
