BIDS ON FIRST UNIT OF OWYHEE PROJECT

Bids To Be Submitted To Denver Reclamation Office. Contracts Should Be Signed At Once.

J. B. Smith, S. D. Goshert, J. J. Sarazin, J. R. Davis, together with P. M. Boals, F. A. Banks and chief engineer Newell and others, formed the advisory board who attended the meeting at Boise, Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the reclamation office, at which time bids were received for the construction of a highway and railroad to the Owyhee damsite. There were eight bids submitted. Twenty-five were in attendance at the meeting.

The General Construction Co. of Seattle, was low bidder for the contract to construct 23 miles of railroad from Adrain, Ore. to the damsite, 20 miles up the Owyhee river canyon from the mouth of the Owyhee river in Malheur County, Oregon. Ryberg, McHugh & Crowley, Boise were low bidders for construction of 20 miles of highway from Adrain to the damsite.

In all probability the railroad will be chosen as the most convenient and profitable means of transportation for materials to be used in construction and it is most likely to be built. It is also assured that work will begin within thirty days after the bids are accepted.

We regret to say that they are short a few thousand acres of the required 75 per cent which must be obtained before the government will go ahead with work and it is earnestly requested that those who have failed to sign the contracts for land holdings, will give their attention to this important detail, thereby hastening the work which can only mean advancement for everyone.

Two million dollars has been appropriated by congress for preliminary work on this great project, let everyone involved do their part in signing the contracts so as not to delay further advancement. The government is ready to go ahead just as quickly as the contracts are signed.

The lowest bid for the construction of the railroad was \$294,592 by the General Construction Co. of Seattle and the lowest bid given for construction of the highway was \$179,350 by Ryberg, McHugh & Crowley, of Boise.
