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The First Amendment

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

Those who observe the first day of the week as the Sabbath instead of the seventh, as commanded by the Scriptures, very often excuse their disregard of the commandment by saying that it does not matter which day you keep, just so you keep one day in seven. We have personally heard this dozens of times. They will admit that Sunday is not the Sabbath of the commandment but will satisfy their conscience by the above explanation. Suppose congress should yield to the pressure brought by the Lord's Day Alliance and kindred organizations and pass the Sunday closing bill, would the sponsors of the bill be willing to adopt this principle and allow anyone to keep any day in seven that they wished? Anyone who thinks so is due for a severe shock in case the Lankford bill is passed. The very ones who insist on this right for themselves would deny it to others had they the power. Evidently the Golden Rule doesn't mean much in their young lives. Nor do they seem to take the law of God very seriously.

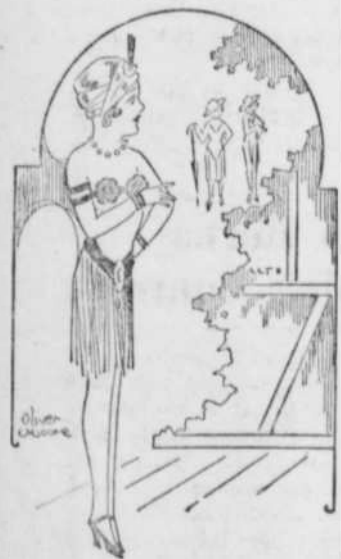

ELECTRICAL BENEFITS

An editorial appearing in the New York Sunday American of August 28, 1927, shows the part that electricity has played in the improvement of conditions in the United States as compared with the rest of the world.

This editorial also says:

"The woman who does not clean, wash and iron by electricity values her time at less than three Cents an Hour. Five cents spent for electricity will run a washing machine for two hours. It will make a hot kitchen comfortable with an electric fan for ten hours. It will run a sewing machine for seven hours. It will keep a refrigerator cold for eight hours. It will run a vacuum cleaner for three hours. It will light a reading lamp for two entire evenings."

This is based upon the average cost of electricity for these purposes throughout the United States, while those customers who use the Idaho Power Company's new combination rates can get nearly three times as much service.

Five Cents spent with this Company will:

Run the washing machine 5 hours;
Keep the kitchen cool with an electric fan 28 hours; Run a sewing machine 20 hours; Keep the refrigerator cool 22 hours; Run a vacuum cleaner 8 hours. Light a reading lamp 5 evenings.
