KING BEN DIDN'T RISE

One more illustration of the pitiful ignorance and superstition which still exists in these United States was furnished by the recent death of "King Ben" Purell, leader of the House of David cult at Benton Harbor, Michigan.

After his swindling and debauching of his "disciples" for nearly thirty years, the more credulous still believed him to be divine and waited confidently for his resurrection on the third day after his death.

But King Ben failed to come through. They begged the health authorities to delay his burial another day, still hoping that he would rise from the dead. The request was granted, but as the laws of Michigan do not recognize the possibility of miracles, a further extension was refused after the fourth day likewise ended without any sign of a come-back from the corpse.

Through his leadership of this colony which he had duped into accepting his peculiar religious and social program, Benjamin Purell had amassed considerable wealth. Many persons of means had turned over to him all their possessions and he ruled the community like a despot.

Like many other founders of a fantastic religion, Purell provided in his scheme that he should possess a number of women adherents. His carryings-on in this respect were recently the subject of an official investigation and the colony had been ordered to disband.

Even in the face of the fiasco which attended his resurrection, it is likely that most of his followers will still believe that as a prophet he was the real thing.

But by the skeptical his career will be seen as confir-

ming a saying of Sophocles: "All prophets are lovers of gain."
