**THEIR PROGRAM**

The following interview by Rev. Harry L. Bowlby, national secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance, may be illuminating to those who do not know the aims and purposes of the backers of Sunday closing legislation. The interview was published in the Philadelphia Public Ledger of November 23, 1920. Said the Rev. Harry:

We are well financed. Our lobby at Washington will be an effective and experienced one. We shall work in every congressional district in every state. We shall agitate and spread propaganda, and cause voters to write unceasingly to their representatives in congress, until no congressman who cares to stay in congress will dare to refuse to vote for our measures. They were the measures used by the Anti-Saloon League, and they were effective.

We propose to pass no blue laws. There are no such things as blue laws—never were. And we don't propose to legislate people into church. We propose, by legislation, to make it easier for people to go to church. In other words, we shall try to close the baseball parks, the golf links, the motion picture and other theaters, the concert halls, the amusement parks, the bathing beaches, and so on. We shall fight all amusements where an admission fee is charged. We shall oppose golf, tennis, baseball, football, and other sports, even if purely amateur and void of financial cost to those watching or taking part, because they set a bad example for children who otherwise might be content to go to Sunday school.

We shall seek to restrict the sale of gasoline to pleasure automobiles, and urge other measures that will stop Sunday automobiling and joy-riding. This will not bring the old horse and buggy back because we believe that the Lord's Day should be a day of rest for man and beast. Excursion steamer rides on Sunday will be opposed by us on the ground that they are unnecessary to the moral welfare of Christian America.

"How many churches are behind the movement?" the reporter asked. Sixteen denominations, he (Bowlby) replied.

Really we have seventeen, for while the Lutheran synod did not endorse this movement officially, the Lutherans are with us. Only the Roman Catholics, the Unitarians, the Seventh Day Adventists, and the Jews are outside the movement. And, to be perfectly frank with you, they will have to conform to the laws if we succeed. The Jew will have to observe our Sabbath. As a matter of fact he wishes as well, because Saturday is not, after all, his Sabbath. He is wrong by the revised calendar. Therefore it will work no hardship on him to attend his synagogue on the same day we attend our churches.

No, I see no reason why the public libraries or art galleries should remain open on Sunday. We shall seek to eliminate the huge Sunday newspapers and establish a censorship over the stuff that gets into them on other days.

Of course we will back no law that would compel a man or woman to attend church. But we believe that if we take away a man's motor car, his golf sticks, his Sunday newspaper, his horses, his pleasure steamships, amusement houses, and park, and prohibit him from playing outdoor games or witnessing field sports, he naturally will drift back to the church.

We propose to close all stores, pharmacies excepted. And it is our hope that pharmacists may be limited to the sale of medicines only, on Sundays.

That's the program, folks, as announced by the official spokesman of 16 of the leading churches of America, including the Methodist and Presbyterian. How do you like it?

Do the churches really want the principle established that matters of religion are to be settled by majority vote of the electorate? That is what the attempt to force Sunday closing laws means. At the present time they may think they have the power to put their program over—and maybe they have. But it is entirely within the range of possibility that the other side may some time, by organization,

muster sufficient strength to overthrow their laws and pass some of their own, possibly making Saturday the legal holy day. In that event we imagine that our Sunday closing friends would suddenly discover that their constitutional rights were being invaded. It makes a vast difference sometimes whose ox is gored.

The Church of England just now is a horrible example of the evils of a union of church and state. It seems that after the theologians of the church had spent several years formulating a new prayer book satisfactory to all factions of the church, it had to be passed upon by Parliament, a secular body. For some reason or other the House of Commons refused to sanction it and the new prayer book failed of adoption. The church is said to be badly disrupted as a result and is seriously considering withdrawing from state control. This would mean a loss of state support, however, which gives them pause. The matter seems to resolve itself into a question of whether it is better to have liberty of action without state support or give up liberty of action and retain state support.
