The residents have more than enjoyed the improvements to the Main Street during the winter months, noting a remarkable difference in their condition from previous years and when the lights are completed Nyssa will have a main thoroughfare of which it may be justly proud.

Corrects Portland Journal

A recent issue of the Portland Journal stated editorially that "If the Union Pacific had an east and west extension through Central Oregon it would leave the present main line at Ontario." Win Brown of Vale corrected this statement in the following words, the correction being published in the Journal:

"This shows how little even the best posted residents of Portland know their Eastern Oregon geography. Why should a great transcontinental railroad run several miles out of its way just for the fun of running back again. The answer is, it would not. A glance at the map will show that the Central Oregon extension, when built, will leave the main line at some point near Nyssa and connect with the Burns branch at a point about half way between Nyssa and Vale."

It is the general belief in this neck of the woods that the Homedale branch, which at present leaves the main line at Nyssa will eventually be made the main line and either go directly across the hills to Vale or follow on down parallel to the state highway and join the Burns branch about the mouth of the Malheur valley.

NEW AUTO PARK BEING CONSTRUCTED

Among the numerous improvements started and contemplated in Nyssa this season is an up-to-date auto park. The site of the park adjoins the public school grounds on the north and lies just west of the State Highway. The work has already commenced and will be rushed to early completion in order to be ready for auto traffic in the spring.

Five buildings 12x18 with partition in the center will be constructed at once, with more in contemplation as the demand requires.

These buildings will be furnished ready for use of campers. Other features will be a community kitchen where campers can cook their meals, hot and cold baths, good camp grounds, a driveway from the highway to the camp grounds. An up to date Service Station will also be erected, in fact, everything that is required by a modern auto park.

A company composed of C. G. Hoover, E. L. Ruddy and Paul Seburn, all local men, are promoting the project, which will cost about \$5000.

RAILROAD WORK ADVANCING STEADILY

Work on the railroad to the damsite is reported to be moving along steadily two crews from Mitchell Butte camp being employed by the General Construction Co.

The Jackson Stoner Co. are moving along rapidly with their end of the work and their steam shovel is expected to arrive today.

Men have been put to work on the Puckett Contract, clearing brush and the machinery for this section of the work will arrive within the next few days, thereby putting the entire line into activity.

Mr. Puckett was in town Tuesday outlining the work to be done and making necessary arrangements preparatory to commencement of work.

Nyssa is being crowded with men seeking employment as the reports of the building of the railroad are circulated over the country.
