RAILROAD WORK IS ADVANCING STEADILY

With the sounds of blasting which are being heard in Nyssa we are assured that the work on the railroad is daily progressing.

Altho' the recent snow has retarded the work to a certain extent, every thing is developing in a satisfactory manner.

All contractors have crews at work and the arrival during the past week of another steam shovel for the work on the upper end of the road would indicate that no time is being lost in that direction.

The General Construction Company working about forty men on two shifts are making fast work of their part of the contract.

The Jackson-Stoner crew are gaining headway on their section and with the arrival of their steam shovel a few days will see a lot of dirt moved there.

C. W. Puckett is on the ground and outlining the work to be done there. Machinery and equipment is arriving daily and the steam shovel is due almost any day.

The tunnel crew have been working for two weeks and by the first of the month the work will extend along the entire line. This gives employment to about 125 men.

A GOOD SHOWING

In the Sunday Oregonian is given a summary of the cities and towns of Oregon whose banks have combined deposits of over \$500,000. The list gives 55 cities and towns in this class, Nyssa being 52nd, with deposits of \$380,792.92. As Nyssa only has one bank, the Malheur County, it is entitled to credit for the entire amount, which makes a remarkably good showing, both for the town and the bank. It indicates both a prosperous community and a confidence in the strength and stability of our bank that must be gratifying to the management.

There are 252 banks in the state, with combined deposits of \$310,654,231.63. There are 102 towns in the state that fall below the \$50,000 mark.
