OWYHEE IRRIGATION DISTRICT MEET

February begins the year for the Owyhee Irrigation District and at their regular meeting Monday night S. D. Goshert was sworn in as new director.

The board was organized for the coming year with J. J. Sarazin, President, Bruce Kester, Atty. and Frank Morgan, Secy.

The following resolutions were drawn in behalf of the Board to voice their appreciation for the efforts of E. C. Van Petten:

TOWN COUNCIL MEETS

The City Council met in regular session Monday evening with a full board present and Mayor Francis in the chair.

A number of matters of importance came up for consideration and were satisfactorily disposed of. A number of applications for building, totaling \$3620.00 in amount were read and granted.

Fire limits were extended from Third street to Fifth street for one half block deep on each side of Main Street.

An ordinance prohibiting the building of crossings over sidewalks or installing oil tanks along side of main street without permission of the Council was read and adopted. This ordinance is designed to prevent the installation of any more filling stations on Main St without the consent of the Council.

An application for permit to open a pool hall in the Strode building opposite the postoffice was refused, as the ordinance governing such matters allows only one pool hall for every 500 inhabitants, and with two already established the limit is reached.

An order for the purchase of a machine for driving piping under streets was made, the same to cost \$50. This will do away with the necessity of digging ditches across the street and injuring the surfacing.

The Council received notice that if they would have the marshal lock the postoffice door at 10 p. m. that the lobby would be left open until that hour for convenience of patrons and the marshal was duly instructed to do so. Heretofore the outer door has been locked at 6:30 p. m.

A number of minor matters were also considered.

BAND DINNER A SUCCESS

The committee who managed the successful Band dinner given Wednesday evening at the Commercial rooms want to thank the public for their wonderful cooperation in making this one of the most successful affairs of the season.

The attendance was all that was to be expected over two hundred people estimated to have been present and a general good time was enjoyed. The proceeds which amounted to about \$75 will go to the Nyssa Band.

The dinner which the ladies started to serve at 5:30 lasted until 8 o'clock after which the Band gave a concert.

NYSSA WOOL POOL SOLD

The Nyssa Wool Pool for the coming clip, handled by J. P. Dunaway, was sold the latter part of last week to A. Koshland & Co. of Boston, Mass for the record price of 85 cents a pound, bringing to the producers for their estimated clip of between 650,000, and 700,000 pounds \$260,000.00.

Last season's clip sold for 83 cents showing a gain of 2 cents per pound this year and a one cent more than any pool sold so far this season.

An invitation has been extended to Nyssa to send a representative to Washington, D. C. to attend a conference to be held Feb. 14 and 15, to discuss the settlement and farm development of the new projects.


