Water users take notice that the charges for city water when used for irrigation purposes have been raised.

The rates now are 20c per foot frontage for irrigation from the high pressure system with a minimum charge of \$10.00, and 10c per foot frontage for irrigation from the low pressure system with a minimum charge of \$5.00.

All users of water for irrigation purposes will be required to pay at the above mentioned rates for the present season of 1928.

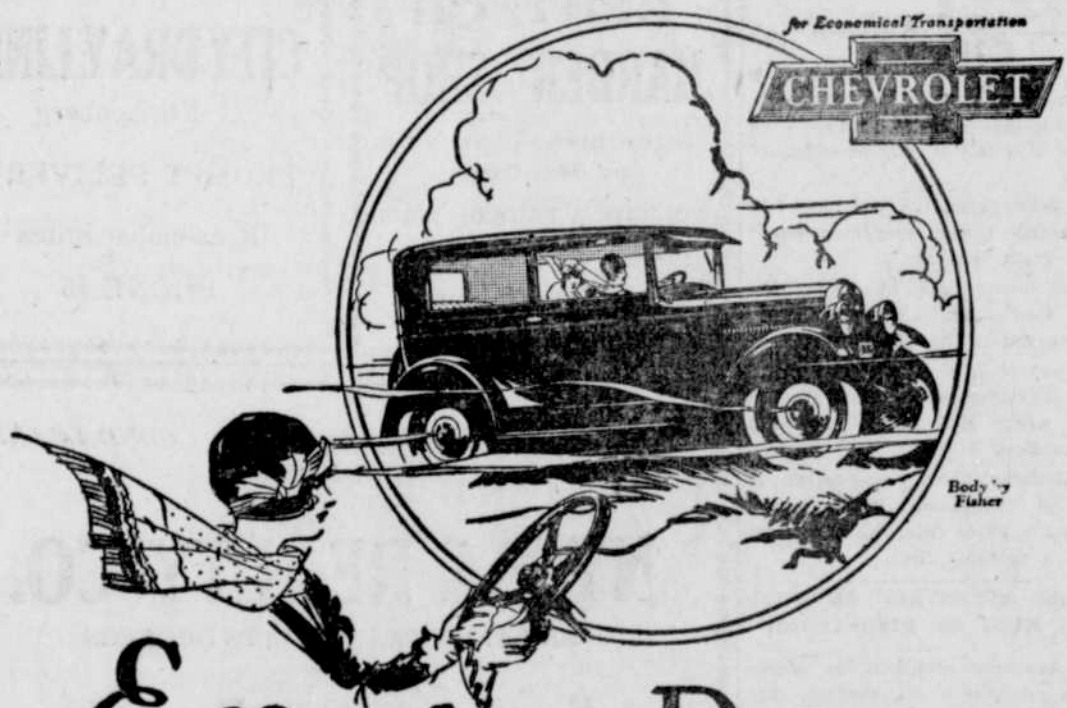
