COUNTY COURT HEARS FAIR REPRESENTATIVES

ONTARIO DELEGATES WOULD MAKE FAIR A MORE COUNTY-WIDE SHOW

Not an Ontario fair—but a county fair—is the incentive of E. O. Walters, director of the Malheur county fair board, and W. C. Higgins, instructor of vocational agriculture, of Ontario, who have been traveling about the county to work up interest in the fall farm show. The visitors, who were here on Wednesday, are particularly anxious to induce farmers of all parts of the county to bring in crop exhibits.

Mr. Walters is of the opinion that too many prizes are going to Idaho exhibitors, as he firmly believes that Malheur county can produce farm products that are quite as creditable.

The fair representatives attended the county court meeting and made a request that the \$1000 appropriation be used in the near future for the repair and painting of fair buildings. Judge H. Lee Noe will look over the prospective work on Sunday.

The matter of the repair of the old Vale bridge was also discussed and Judge Noe advised that as yet, no report has been received from the state bridge inspectors, who were here recently to determine whether or not the bridge will be safe for travel, if it is repaired.

EASTER MARKED BY DEATHS AND FATAL ACCIDENTS

ONTARIO YOUTH FATALLY INJURED IN FALL FROM MALHEUR BUTTE

DEATH CLAIMS DR. POGUE

Pioneer Physician Was The True Friend of Malheur County Oldtimers

Two tragic accidents and the passing of Dr. G. A. Pogue, venerable pioneer physician of Malheur county made Easter an epochal day in Ontario. Dr. Pogue came to this section in 1891 and for years was the only doctor in the county. Oldtimers of this community praise him as a man of kindly disposition, one who rendered great service to his fellow men. It has been said that, regardless of money or position, Dr. Pogue would travel many miles in the old days, to lend assistance to some sufferer. He died very suddenly while talking to a friend in his home in Ontario.

Youth Killed by Fall

An Easter hike for members of the Ontario Boy Scout patrol ended in the second tragedy, when Max Smith, 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Smith, received fatal injuries when he fell down a rocky cliff on the Malheur butte, near Vale. The boy was climbing on the hill with other members of the Scout troupe. He slipped and fell 30 feet to the rocks below and then rolled to the foot of the precipice, another 150 feet below. His companions made a stretcher and carried him more than a mile before the doctor arrived. The youth sustained a fractured skull and many broken bones, never regaining consciousness. He died on Monday.

Man Badly Hurt

Earl Whitey of Halfway was crushed by his horse when it fell upon him at the fair grounds, where he was corralling a bunch of horses, Sunday. He had three ribs broken, broken collar bone and shoulder, as well as internal injuries. It is believed that he will recover.

GOVERNMENT WILL SPEND \$2,750,000 HERE NEXT YEAR

The sum of \$2,750,000 has been appropriated for the continuance of construction work on the Vale and Owyhee projects in Malheur county, for the fiscal year beginning June 30, 1928, and ending on June 30, 1929. An article in the April issue of New Reclamation Era, government publication, states that the following sums have been appropriated:

Vale project: For the operation and maintenance, \$6,000; continuation of construction, \$744,000, of which amount not more than \$150,000 shall be available for the purchase of a proportionate interest in the existing storage reservoir of the Warm Springs project; in all, \$750,000.

Owyhee project: For continuance of construction, \$2,000,000.

VOTERS ATTENTION. TO VOTE YOU MUST BE REGISTERED

The custom heretofore in effect of registering voters on the day of election and of "swearing in" voters, is discontinued by act of the legislature. No one will be able to vote who is not properly registered before the books close on April 18.

Voters have four days more in which to register. Candidates for county, state and national offices are to be voted in at the May primary and it is a civic duty that everyone should take part in.
