NYSSA YOUTH CALLED BY DEATH

John A. Johnson, Nyssa, freshman forestry student, lost a battle for life Thursday night, when pneumothorax proved fatal in the college hospital, after a week's illness, in which artificial respiration from oxygen had been used.

Appeals for oxygen tanks from the Corvallis hospital Monday resulted in sending six oxygen tubes from the local fire department by Fire Chief Green (fell of Portland). With this aid, life was sustained for four days, while brothers arrived from Eastern Oregon. His parents are dead.

Ulcers of lungs, allowing air to escape, was the explanation of the disease given by college and private physicians who battled for the boy's life.

The above sad news when received by Nyssa friends and acquaintances brought gloom to the community, when they learned that John Johnson had lost his battle for life being called from a life of ambition and promise in his twentieth year.

John A. Johnson was born in Ontario Oregon, February 25th, 1908. His life had been lived in Malheur County and went through school in Nyssa, graduating with the Class of 1926.

At the time of his death he was attending the O. A. C. at Corvallis, a freshman forestry student.

Funeral services were held in Nyssa Monday afternoon, Rev. Broyle of Ontario officiating. Mrs. McCoy and Miss Edna Dennis with Mrs. C. C. Hunt as accompanist gave vocal selections and a large concourse of sorrowing friends paid homage to the youth whose untimely death took from Nyssa a highly esteemed and honorable young man.

John is survived by his brothers, A. K. Johnson and William Johnson of Ontario, Oregon. Tom C. Johnson of Nyssa, Oregon. F. N. Johnson and a sister, Mrs. C. H. Wallace of Spokane, Wash. to which the sympathy of this community is extended.
