OFFICIALS MEET WITH OWYHEE DIST. BOARD

Messrs. Kreutzer, Dent, Hayden, Banks Discuss Settlement Plans For Coming Year

Geo. C. Kreutzer, director of reclamation economics, P. W. Dent, assistant commissioner of the bureau of reclamation, B. E. Hayden and F. A. Banks met with the Owyhee District Board Monday at the Nyssa office for the purpose of discussing in detail the program for the coming year respective to the plans of settlement etc. A lengthy discussion of a booklet describing the Owyhee Project took place and was definitely settled and the material will be in the hands of the government printer at an early date. The government photographer will be on the ground this coming week collecting material for the booklet. A similar publication will be gotten out for the Vale Project.

The power from the Black Canyon was also discussed and was found to be available when needed, providing satisfactory terms cannot be made with the Idaho Power Co.

After the meeting, Frank Morgan, Secy. of the Owyhee District, along with Messrs. Kreutzer, Dent, Hayden and Banks motored over the land from Adrain to Weiser and the officials were loud in their praise of both the raw and cultivated land in the territory covered.

It is to be hoped that a liberal amount will be available for next year when the appropriation budget is completed and favorable reports from the officials may help to that end.

Tuesday and Wednesday Messrs. Kreutzer and Dent met with the Vale and Warm Springs Board going over in detail their plans for those projects. They were also to confer with Roy Luper, state engineer and the Warm Springs Board as to buying more storage water.

NYSSA LOST FIRST GAME LAST SUNDAY

It was a disgusted bunch of ball fans that wended their way home to Nyssa Sunday after the game at Weiser between the Nyssa and Weiser teams.

Their disgust was not due entirely to the fact their team was beaten by a score of 6 to 2, but was largely on account of their belief that the Nyssa team was beaten by a team greatly inferior to them in playing ability. However, the fact remains that they were beaten, and beaten fairly. There is no use in trying to alibi the boys by claiming "weird decisions" or "petty rooting." It was the Nyssa boys off day and they simply couldn't play ball. Apparently they had forgotten all they ever knew about the game and didn't know they were supposed to hit the ball when they went to the bat or that it was considered the proper thing to hold the ball when it was thrown to them. They were beaten, but not because their opponents put up high class ball. Had the Nyssa boys played their usual game they would have won easily.

A large number from Nyssa witnessed the game. Probably fifty per cent of the audience were Nyssaites, the people of Weiser, apparently not taking much interest in the game. One feature of the occasion that caused considerable comment was the fact that the visiting team was forced to sit out in the sun on a bench composed of a board laid across two apple boxes while the Weiser team occupied the regular bench in the shade of the grandstand. The improvised bench was not long enough to hold all the visiting team, and finally broke down altogether, but there was plenty of vacant ground around for the boys to sit on so they got along alright.

The return game will be played July 1st on the Nyssa field and the boys are in hopes of making a better showing.

FRANK SHERWOOD O. A. C. GRADUATE

Completes Work For Bachelor Of Science Degree In Agriculture At O. A. C.



The following announcement from the Oregon State Agricultural College at Corvallis gives honorable mention of Frank Sherwood, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Sherwood of Nyssa: "Nyssa is represented by Frank W. Sherwood in the graduating class of 1928 which totals more than 500. Mr. Sherwood is among those receiving degrees at the annual commencement exercises June 4. The graduating class is composed of those who "survived" four years of rigorous work, during which their scholarship has been kept high enough to meet the requirements here. The college does not grant a degree to anyone whose average is lower than a "C" even though he may have accumulated sufficient credits.

Mr. Sherwood has completed work for a bachelor of science degree in agriculture. This school has won a wide reputation throughout the country, and even the world, for quality of work done, and while it is not the largest in point of number of students, it annually attracts men, and even women from distant points, some of whom come for graduate work.

For the first two years, Sherwood and the other graduates in this school took a general course, then chose a specialty from among the departments of animal husbandry, farm crops, horticulture, dairy husbandry, agricultural engineering, poultry husbandry, farm management, economics and education. Women and men both major in landscape gardening under the school of agriculture, or in the section of horticultural products.

Sherwood was a member of the national stock-judging team this year; the Dairy club, of which he was treasurer; and the Oregon Countryman staff for the past two years."

A big program of sports has been arranged for the day and the village is preparing to entertain several hundred visitors.

Bids are to be opened at the district office in Nyssa and the successful contractor is expected to commence work at once on preliminaries of construction."
