To his only son and his family who have been called upon to bear the loss of a devoted father, the sincere sympathy of the community is extended.

Funeral services were held at the Methodist Church in Nyssa Wednesday afternoon with the Rev. Eroyie, Baptist minister of Ontario, officiating. A large concourse of friends gathered to pay their last respects to their old friend. Burial took place in the Ontario cemetery.

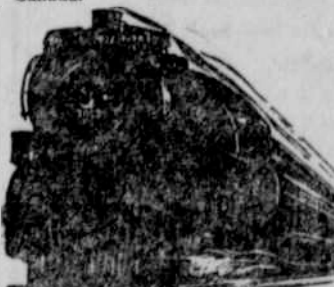
