COMMERCIAL CLUB IS RE-ORGANIZED

A lively group congregated at the Owyhee District office Wednesday evening for the purpose of re-organizing the Nyssa Commercial Club.

The meeting was called to order by President C. L. McCoy. A short discussion followed regarding the advisability of reorganizing, it being moved by Mr. Hollenberg and seconded by Mr. Morgan that the club be reorganized and the motion carried.

Moved by Mr. Morgan seconded by Mr. Brown that a nominating committee of four including the Chair be appointed. Messrs. Hollenberg, Goshert and Dr. Sarasin were appointed. The nominations were as follows: President, E. M. Blodgett; Vice President, H. T. Francis; Secy. Roy Willoughby; Treasurer A. H. Boydell. The Secretary was instructed to cast unanimous ballot.

Moved by Dr. Sarasin seconded by Mr. McCoy that each member sign a slip instructing the bank to credit the commercial club with a given amount each month and charge to their account and the motion carried. Moved by Mr. Hollenberg, seconded by Mr. Morgan that a finance committee of three be appointed by the chair, to relieve the secretary of the duty of gathering up of these slips. This carried and Sid Burbridge, Dr. Sarasin, S. D. Goshert, and Ernest Wilson were appointed.

Moved by Dick Tensen, seconded by C. L. McCoy that a permanent Park committee be appointed by the chair. The motion carried and Messrs. Morgan, Francis and Hollenberg were appointed.

It was moved by Sid Burbridge and seconded by C. L. McCoy that the by-laws be amended changing the regular meeting night from the second Thursday to the second Wednesday of each month.

Moved by Frank Morgan, seconded by Barney Wilson, that a Hotel committee be appointed by the chair to investigate any possible prospects for a hotel in Nyssa. This motion was amended with Mr. Morgan's approval to include any industry that might be interested in Nyssa the committee to be known as the New Industry Committee.

Motion carried and J. P. Dunaway, C. L. McCoy and Roy Willoughby were appointed on this committee.

Moved by H. F. Brown, seconded by H. T. Francis that Mr. Morgan be reimbursed for any expense of trip to Parma to meet with the Idaho Road Commission.

Moved by C. L. McCoy and seconded by Dick Tensen that a committee of three be appointed by the chair to be known as a Road Committee. The motion carried and Harry Howell, W. B. Hoxie and Eddie Powell were appointed.

Moved by Mr. Hollenberg, seconded by Mr. Francis that a committee of three be appointed by the chair on luncheons and luncheon programs. Messrs. Hollenberg, Goshert and Dick Tensen were appointed.

No further business, the meeting adjourned until Wednesday, July 11.

OFFICIALS COMING ON INSPECTION TOUR

Dr. Mead Soon To Arrive. The Railroad, Power And Telephone Work Progressing Rapidly.

Dr. Elwood Mead is now on his western tour of inspection of all reclamation projects, having reached Salt Lake City from which place he will go to California and it is expected that he will arrive in this vicinity around the 10th of July for a thorough inspection of the Vale, Owyhee and Black Canyon projects.

Messrs. Lawler and Hindmarsh of the General Construction Co. will arrive from Seattle, Saturday for the purpose of organizing and outlining the work in connection with the dam, to determine the location and building of the camp and working out the details of the construction of this mammoth contract.

The railroad from Dunaway Siding to the dam site is progressing in a very satisfactory manner, the track is now laid to Mitchell Butte, covering ten miles of the twenty-two, and the shovel is now in the pit loading cars for ballasting the track.

The power and telephone line is also making good progress, several miles of pole line being visible from the road to the dam. Helts & O'Donnel of Portland were awarded this contract, they sub-letting to Wim p & Howell, who are pushing the work along.

ELEVATOR SHOWS UP

Towering to a height of 110 feet the new elevator which is being built in Nyssa, takes on skyscraper appearance and is an added improvement in our little city.

The coming week will see work on the 45x70 foot warehouse started and within the next few weeks the work in it's entirety will be completed. A large amount of grain can be handled at this elevator, it being of a 60,000 bushel capacity.
