WORK ON RAILROAD STEADILY ADVANCING

The work on the railroad from Dunaway Siding to the Owyhee Dam site steadily advances as each day track is being laid on the right of way between these two points.

Twelve miles of the twenty-two miles of track has been laid and the shovel at the pit is at work moving material for ballasting the road, thus practically completing the same as they go along.

The General Construction Co. who have the contract for the work of building the Owyhee Dam have perfected their plans for the building of a temporary camp at the dam site and work will begin on the same within a few days.

WORK SOON TO START ON WILSON BUILDING

The plans call for the completion of the building within 90 days after the contract is let, and it is expected that arrangements will be made within a few days so that the work may begin.

PARK COMMITTEE GET MORE LAND

The Park Committee appointed at the last week meeting of the Commercial Club have made their first step successfully, to obtain a portion of the land necessary for the realization of a City Park.

Block 12 in Teutsch addition has been obtained from Roy Willoughby, in exchange for Block 7 in Teutsch addition and the additional consideration of \$50, this to be paid jointly by the Civic and Commercial Clubs.

At the town council meeting Monday evening Mayor Francis and Recorder, Robt. Millar were instructed to make the transfer and the deeds were recorded, thereby giving in addition to the ball park, which is Block 11 Teutsch addition, the newly acquired block 12, for a park.

An inquiry is also being made from non-resident owners of adjoining properties, as to the possibility of getting more ground for this purpose.

The inspiration for this important move toward the realization of a much wanted and needed public necessity has created no little amount of interest and enthusiasm in Nyssa.

NEW POSTAL RATES ARE NOW EFFECTIVE

Beginning July 1 books sent from and returned to free public libraries receive a greatly decreased rate provided in a bill recently passed by congress, and amended through the efforts of the Oregon State Library and the Oregon senators, following the library's protest against a proposed increase. The new rate omits altogether the former service charge of two cents per package, reduces the cost of the initial pound from five and six cents to a flat rate of 3 cents, throughout the state. All additional pounds to the third zone will cost one cent instead of two cents each. The state thus becomes one zone for library books, which receive a preferential rate.

The state library in 1926 sent out to its patrons 23,531 packages of books. The initial saving on these, regardless of size and weight, would be \$1150, which will accrue to the benefit of the country patrons of the library, as they refund the postage charges when the books are returned. The state library estimates a saving of from \$3000 to \$3500 a year to its patrons, and a great increase in the mail order use of state, county and city libraries.

NYSSA AND VALE TIE IN 4TH OF JULY GAME

Those of Nyssa and elsewhere who witnessed the ball game played between Nyssa and Vale on the Fourth of July at the Riverside Park in Vale will remember it as one of the best played games of the season.

Both teams playing for \$250 were full of pep and on their toes from the beginning to the last of the 11-inning game, as was evidenced by the final 1 to 2 score.

Vale made the first tally in the fourth inning, while Nyssa evaded the score in the fifth. Vale put another mark to her credit in the sixth, while Nyssa brought in a man in the seventh. After that both teams played ball that gave the thousands of spectators a continuous thrill. Kitchen pitched for Vale, while Rambaud and Burton pitched for Nyssa.
