## RECLAMATION NEWS

Dr. Elwood Mead, U. S. reclamation commissioner, J. L. Savage, designing engineer, and R. F. Walters, chief engineer, are expected to arrive in Nyssa Saturday, July 21, on their tour of inspection of the Vale, Owyhee and Warm Springs projects. They are on a tour, visiting all the western projects, and are coming to Nyssa from California. W. F. Kierbach, chief accountant, was in Nyssa last week checking over the business at the Nyssa office, having come directly from Washington, D. C.

B. F. Hayden reclamation economist, is in Nyssa, having recently returned from a business trip to Nebraska.

The railroad from Dunaway Siding to the Owyhee dam site is advancing, sixteen miles of rail being laid to the first river crossing, and ballasting work is progressing.

A camp at the dam site is being built by the Seattle Construction Co. About 15 men are employed and are making rapid headway. In another week work will begin on the diversion tunnel, the necessary equipment for this work now being on the road.

## INSTALLING \$500 STERILIZING PLANT

The Shelton dairy, near Nyssa, recently installed a large cooler for handling their milk and are now installing a \$500 sterilizing plant, making that dairy one of the most modern and up-to-date in Malheur county. There are also a number of smaller dairymen in this vicinity who are making every effort to comply with all requirements in putting out a sanitary product.

## INCREASE IN DEPOSITS

An increase of \$95,136.44 in deposits at the Malheur County Bank shows this institution is doing a fine business. The official bank statement of the bank's deposits on February 28, 1928, was \$552,515.12, while the deposits at the end of June 30, 1928, are \$647,651.56 showing almost a \$100,000 increase.

## DAIRY INSPECTORS MEET LOCAL DAIRYMEN

Prof. Copson of Eugene, state dairy inspector, and four associates were in Nyssa Monday of this week for the purpose of acquainting and impressing the people of Nyssa and Malheur county with the state requirements in regard to the handling of milk and dairy products.

A meeting was held and facts and figures cited laying stress on the absolute necessity of sanitation in the handling of milk and all dairy products so as to do away with the bacteria, reducing this danger to the lowest minimum possible.

It was suggested that Vale, Nyssa and Ontario get together and outline a plan whereby each city council could draw up an ordinance for their respective municipalities governing the handling of this important protection to health. The state requires all vessels, bottles, etc., to be thoroughly sterilized either by hot water or steam, and also a cooler. This does not necessarily mean that an expensive equipment is imperative, but that any simple equipment that meets the requirements of the small dairyman.

After inspection by the state officials no little amount of criticism was forthcoming regarding the condition of some of our back alleys and premises and it would be a wise plan for all those alleys will not bear inspection to busy themselves cleaning it, thereby making it unnecessary for the health board to notify them. All garbage should be burned and fly-breeders done away with to safeguard the public from disease.
