NYSSA TO HAVE
STEAM LAUNDRY

A part of the machinery has arrived from Portland and the balance will be on hand and the equipment will be placed so as to enable them to be ready for business within the next ten days. This will indeed be a real convenience to the people of Nyssa, enabling them to receive their laundry the same day it is sent out.

Lakeview Park is a beautiful place and there is plenty of room and shade for the several hundred people who will attend.

GREAT OWYHEE DAM
CENTER OF INTEREST

The following article on the Owyhee project is taken from the Pacific Builder and Engineer of July 7:

'Bid openings on two major dam structures shifted the center of Uncle Sam's reclamation program from central Washington to central and eastern Oregon last month. One of the dams—the Owyhee—is the largest yet undertaken by the Bureau of Reclamation and is the outstanding item of the \$15,000,000 program underway in the Pacific Northwest. The other is the half-million dollar diversion dam on the Vale project.

'Of all the projects involved in the huge reclamation program centered in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana the Owyhee project is perhaps the most interesting from the standpoint of the engineer and contractor. The cost of the dam, according to the low bid of the General Construction Co. of Seattle, will be \$3,198,799—about one-half the total cost of the project. It will tower 520 feet above the lowest concrete in the foundation cut-off and will be 405 feet at maximum section—which J. L. Savage, chief designing engineer of the Denver office, Bureau of Reclamation, says in the 'New Reclamation Era' is likely to stand 'as the highest dam in the world until the great Boulder dam is constructed.'

'The Owyhee dam will be of the concrete arch-gravity type, with about three-fourths of the water load carried to the abutments by arch action and one-fourth carried to the base by cantilever action. Radius of the upstream face at the top will be 30 feet and the bottom thickness at maximum section 225 feet. The upstream face will be vertical for the top 75 feet and below this will have a batter of 0.05 to 1. The down stream face will be generally on a slope of 0.625 to 1.

'At a cost of almost \$100,000 three leading geologists and consulting engineers made five different geological examinations of the 'Hole-in-the-ground' reservoir site. The examination involved 73 test holes over one and one-half miles. Sand, gravel, cobbles and boulders constitute the first 50 feet of the foundation of the damsite. Below is rhyolite of the same character as that found in the canyon wall. The rhyolite extends to a depth of 170 to 215 feet below the water surface and is bedded on pitchstone agglomerate. Below the agglomerate is tuff of unknown depth. All geological and engineering opinion have agreed that the foundation rock is suitable.

'Preliminary designs and estimates were prepared for five different alternate types of dams. A light arch section, an intermediate arch section, a heavy arch section (arch gravity section) a straight gravity and a lightly curved gravity dam were designed. The heavy arch or 'arch gravity section' was adopted. This type is in reality a section which if straight and not subject to uplift pressure would figure safe as a gravity dam with the resultant line of pressure passing through the downstream one-third point and with a sliding factor of 0.65 or less at all elevations.'
