MEETING HELD TO DISCUSS NEW HOTEL

If present plans of local boosters are successfully consummated Nyssa will at no distant date have a modern up-to-date hotel, and this is a consummation devoutly to be hoped for.

Thursday evening a number of Nyssa business men met with J. I. Buchanan, who represents a construction company with abundant capital, and the question of a hotel for was taken up and discussed at considerable length and from every angle.

The type of hotel most generally favored was a two story structure containing about 40 rooms on the second floor, the first floor to be used largely for merchandising business. Mr. Buchanan estimated such a building would cost approximately \$50,000, his company agreeing to furnish 75 per cent of whatever sum is necessary, the other 25 per cent to be furnished by local people. Mr. Buchanan agreed to have the company's architect draw up plans and specifications for a suitable building, with figures as to its exact cost, for submission to our local people. Nyssa will be represented in the negotiations by the Commercial Club hotel committee, composed of J. P. Dunaway, C. L. McCoy and Roy Willoughby, and Mr. Dunaway expressed the belief that the necessary amount of local capital can be secured. It is understood that the management of the Owyhee hotel at Boise has agreed to furnish the proposed hotel and take over its management.
