GIANT DRAGLINE AT
WORK ON PROJECT

Vale—A giant Page dragline, weight 90 tons, cost \$33,000 f. o. b. Chicago, the largest machine at work on the Vale or Owyhee project, has been viewed by a number of local people since its arrival at Harper direct from Chicago to begin construction of its first job, a ten-mile link of Vale project main canal to be built by the W. H. Puckett company of Boise at a cost of \$261,666. Joseph Walton, erector of the Page company of Chicago, was on the ground for a week, to set up the big machine.

The cabin is as large as a house containing a 148 horsepower, four-cycle Diesel engine that alone weighs 12 tons. The boom is 80 feet long. The bucket of five-cubic yard capacity, will hold an automobile. Mr. Walton says the dragline is one of the largest in use in the United States, the largest having a seven-cubic yard bucket. In an average day's work the Harper dragline will excavate 1500 cubic yards of earth.

As it moved to the site of the Puckett ditch the forepart of the week, a 12-foot section of track is swung around to the front, the boom plants the bucket in the soil and the dragline is pulled forward. Its best speed is 16 feet in four minutes.

Historic Warfare

The Punic wars is the name given in history to a series of wars between Rome and Carthage in the Third and Second centuries B. C. "Punicus" is the Latin or Roman adjective meaning pertaining to the Carthaginians. It is from "Poeni," meaning the inhabitants of Carthage. From the viewpoint of the Romans the Carthaginians were faithless and treacherous; hence Punic faith is a classical phrase meaning bad faith.—Pathfinder Magazine.

"Corpse" and "Corpses"

The modern plural of "corpse" is "corpses" (says Murray). In English the ordinary plural down to 1750 was "corps," though "corpses" is occasional at from the Sixteenth century. In the Seventeenth century "corps," meaning "a single dead body," was often constructed as a plural—"romains," as still the case dialectally. In Scotland "corps," plural, gave rise to a truncated singular "corp" before 1500.
