DR. MEAD PAYS VISIT TO MALHEUR COUNTY

Friday last Dr. Elwood Mead of Washington, D. C., made his initial visit to the Owyhee damsite.

Arriving in Nyssa at an earlier hour than had been anticipated, Dr. Mead immediately went to the Owyhee damsite where he viewed for the first time the mighty work which has just begun.

Two statements made by Dr. Mead while at the damsite were, "Unless the ten year program is disturbed, we can figure on \$3,000,000 a year appropriation for this project" and when questioned as to what his opinion of the site for the Owyhee dam was he answered, "It would be acrimo against nature not to use it."

Saturday, Dr. Mead viewed the Black Canyon Project going from there to Gooding, Idaho, where he was to be joined by R. F. Walters, chief engineer and J. L. Savage, designing engineer, who with their wives are visiting all Western Projects.

Messrs. Walters and Savage and their wives spent Saturday and Sunday at the Owyhee damsite.

Messrs. Lawler and Hindmarsh of the Seattle Construction Co. are now at the damsite and have two crews of men working at either end of the diversion tunnel and there is also a crew at work blasting loose rock from the canyon wall. A trestle across the Owyhee river is being built over which a narrow gauge railroad will be operated to carry off the waste from the tunnel. The railroad work is advancing and a pile bridge is being built across the river beyond Mitchell Butte.

INTERNATIONAL ANTI-CRIME CONFERENCE

The eighth International Anti-Crime Conference will be held at Boise, Idaho, August 16-18. S. E. Notson, District Attorney, Heppner, Oregon, who is State Vice-President of the Northwest Association of Sheriffs and Police, is sending out special invitations to the sheriffs, district attorneys and other law enforcement officials to attend this conference. All governors, sheriffs, circuit judges, district attorneys, mayors and police officers are entitled to membership.

The Northwest Association of Sheriffs and Police is doing a constructive work in combating crime by means of these anti-crime conferences. Criminals are organized to an alarming extent. Hence, the law enforcement officials must organize and co-operate to a greater extent. The Northwest Association is becoming a clearing house for the state, provincial, and local organizations of seven states, three British provinces, and Alaska. Eminent jurists, expert criminologists and others experienced in dealing with law breakers will appear upon the program. The citizens of Boise are preparing to entertain the delegates royally.

MUTUAL BUSINESS TO BE DISCUSSED

Aberdeen, Wash. Saving and loan leaders from ten Western states and the province of British Columbia will gather here August 8 to 11 to discuss mutual business problems. Senator William E. Borah has been invited as the principal speaker for the annual banquet. Over 500 delegates, it is expected, will be in attendance and these will represent associations having assets of \$750,000,000. The visitors will be entertained at banquets, in trips and picnics at the Pacific ocean beaches, 80 miles west of here and in sight seeing trips through sawmills, deer factories, logging camps and big timber.

NYSSA LAUNDRY TO OPEN MONDAY

NYSSA LUMBER CO. OPEN FOR BUSINESS

The Nyssa Lumber Co. opened its doors for business Monday on South First St. in the former location of the old Gem Lumber Co.

While a complete stock was not on hand at the time of opening, Mr. Brinson reports that stock is arriving daily and they will be prepared to furnish building materials of all kinds and with right prices.

They will also handle coal in the near future.

Business started with encouraging prospects the very first day and no doubt with the prospective future for Nyssa the two lumber yards here will have all the business they can handle.

ROAD PROGRAM HALTED

Oregon motorists and taxpayers will be interested in the fact that the so-called \$3 and \$5 measures which would have affected the state highway program, will not appear on the November ballot, as the necessary signatures to initiative petitions were not filed at Salem.

The public mind has become confused through extensive preliminary discussion in the state press of these bills and it should be pointed out, as a matter of interest of the highest importance, that the only measures relating to motor vehicle licenses and a tax on gasoline which will have a place on the ballot are those initiated by Joe Danne of Portland.

Mr. Danne's license bill provides for a general reduction in license fees of approximately 50 per cent. If this bill should be approved by the people in November, the state highway fund will lose about \$2,000,000. The other initiative measure would increase the gasoline tax from three to five cents per gallon. If both bills should pass, the state's income from the gas tax would be increased about \$1,200,000, leaving the highway department with a net loss of nearly \$2,000,000. Should the people approve the decreased license fees set up in the Danne bill and reject the increased gas tax of his other bill, the net loss to the highway fund would amount to a sum equivalent to that now available for new construction and betterments. Under this threatening situation, the highway commission has been forced to call a halt in its contemplated program for next year and to hold in abeyance any expenditure other than maintenance and the mandatory payments of principal and interest on road bonds.

The above figures are based on careful and conservative estimates of state revenues relating to the highway fund, which was set up by the people and the legislature to accomplish a definite program of state road construction. This program is far from completion at this time.
