AERIAL PERFORMANCES FEATURED FOR THE MALHEUR CO. FAIR

Going to take to the air. That is what the managers of the nineteenth annual Malheur County Fair have decided to do. Not that the managers are going to perform aerial stunts, not that—merely that they intend keeping their show on a modern basis, with enough of the pioneer sports of the bushranger to show how completely the present and past can be united in entertainment that is thrilling and entertaining.

Negotiations have been completed and a contract signed for the greatest balloon act ever shown, a triple parachute drop. That will take place every day; this will be done from a balloon or an airplane.

Next there will be wing walking by aerial acrobats, and other breath taking, heart thumping stunts with air ships—several which will be in Ontario for Fair week.

Goat Roping.

Contracts have also been made with Ed Moody, of Caldwell, to direct the program of wild west sports, furnishing the bucking horses and goats to be roped. "Goats" says Mr. Moody, are harder to rope than calves, and they are tougher and cannot be hurt. They also dodge faster than a calf and can run as fast. Down in the southwest they have used goats in roping contests for years, and I believe the public will like the change."

Dog Show.

Already the program committee is assured of a fast race program, for the track is being used now by a number of trainers. But the committee is not counting on races, bucking sports and airplanes only for the amusement and entertainment. One of the finest troops of trained dogs traveling the west will be used in five acts between events so that every minute of the three days afternoon program will be filled with worthwhile amusement.

In preparation for the show the buildings have all been painted and provision made to care for the crowds better than ever before in the nineteen years that the Malheur County Fair has enjoyed the confidence of the public.

ONE CENT-A-MILE EXCURSION RATES

Officials of the Union Pacific System have announced a cent a mile excursion rate to Boise for the Annual Athletic Meet to be held in that city on August 26 and 27.

The special rates will apply on all Oregon Short Line points in Idaho and Utah as well as from Cheyenne, Denver, Las Vegas, Portland, The Dalles, Pendleton and LaGrande.
