## BIBLE LECTURE

The Devil, not God, the author of an eternally burning hell. God is love and just and only punishes the wicked according to their deeds. Rom. 2-6 and Rev. 20.12 and Luke 12-47 and 48.

There is no hell now, for the wicked have not been judged yet. The judgment begins at Christ's coming. 2 Tim. 4-1 and 2 Peter 2.9.

The judgment is to determine how guilty each one is, so that the punishment will be just.

We will notice a few texts that are supposed to teach an eternally burning hell. Matt. 25.46. It says wicked will go into everlasting punishment.

What are the wages or punishment for sin? Rom. 6-23. Death is the primary punishment for sin, and this second death is everlasting, they will never live again.

To regulate the different degrees of punishment the burning is brought in Mal. 4-1 and 3. Another text they use is Rev. 14.11. Smoke of wicked ascendeth up forever.

Where they make their mistake they put their definition on the word forever, instead of the Bible definition. They think forever means for all time.

The Bible uses the word to mean as long as the object applied to lasts. Proof Ex. 21-5-6. Servant was to work for master forever. We know he could work only as long as he lived.

If he had died by accident the next day, forever would have been one day.

How long will the smoke of the wicked ascend? Just as long as they last. Some longer and some shorter, according to their deeds and then brought to ashes. See also 1 Sam. 1-22-23. You will see that forever and as long as he lived were the same length of time.

Another text they use is Mark 9-43. Cast into hell into the fire that never can be quenched. It is true that the fire never shall be quenched for if it was quenched or put out, the wicked would not be brought to ashes as the Bible says they will, but would escape.

When we speak of a burning building as an unquenchable fire we do not mean the building will always be burning. It is true that when we speak of the Christian living forever in Heaven it will be for all time, because God and Christ will last for all time, and the Christian has Christ, and so will live as long as Christ. 1 John 5.12. The sinner has not Christ, and so has not life.

I am glad we have a loving Heavenly Father who is not willing that any should perish, but that all should forsake their sins and be saved, for if they will cling to sin He cannot take them to Heaven for they would not be happy there. They could not do the things they wanted to, so He punishes them just what they deserve and then brings them to ashes and they will be as tho' they had not been. Obadiah 16.

The doctrine of an eternally burning Hell has made thousands of infidels and thousands have gone insane believing their loved ones were writhing in an eternally burning hell. It is a doctrine of the Devil trying to get people to hate God.

If I believed it, Heaven would be the last place I would want to go. I would want to keep just as far away as I could from that kind of a God for the Devil himself could not be a greater tyrant.

Burning is as great a pain as I know of, and to keep it up eternally, the Devil could not make it worse if he tried. No, God is love and a just God and I love Him and want to be with Him and want you to be with Him through eternity.

## ROBERT GRAY KILLED BY J. M. WALLACE

Robert Gray, 19 year old son of Robert Gray, a farmer of Arcadia, was shot and killed the night of August 24, by J. M. Wallace near the Robert Wallace ranch, better known as the Peter Stam place, north of Nyssa.

According to best of information obtainable, a crowd of young people composed of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Golden, Claude Spencer, Helen Zitterreob, Lee Dale, Lucille Dale, Robert Gray and two unknown young ladies who had remained in the car, had started on a visit to the Wallace melon patch, but did not get to the patch as Mr. Wallace appeared on the scene. Dale, Golden and Spencer had gotten well into the field when confronted by Wallace who called to Gray to come up where the boys and himself were. Gray refused to do so and Wallace went down to the road where Gray was talking to four young ladies. After words and an altercation, the shot was fired, the bullet entering the forehead about at the hairline and coming out at the base of the skull. The lad was killed instantly.

The body was taken to the Robert Wallace house where the coroner and officers were notified. Marshall Cook and District Attorney, E. M. Blodgett of Nyssa and Sheriff Glenn and deputy Chas. Leavitt of Vale, arriving to take charge of the situation. The body was then removed to the Peterson Undertaking Parlor at Ontario.

An inquest was held August 25th and the verdict returned was that "Robert Gray came to his death instantly the night of August 24th, by a gunshot wound caused by J. M. Wallace."

The case was submitted to the grand jury which convened Monday, August 28th bringing an indictment of manslaughter against Wallace. He was arraigned for trial at 11 o'clock Thursday morning.

Funeral services were held for Robert Gray were held at Ontario, Sunday August 26th and interment took place in the Ontario cemetery.

The entire community has been stunned by the tragedy.

## RABID COYOTE KILLED IN SHOESTRING VICINITY

One day last week Ira Dale and Robt. Long, while working on the Shoestring Ditch in the vicinity of the pipe-line, observed a coyote acting rather queer and killed it.

The head was taken to Dr. Moore, of Ontario, who sent it to the office of the Portland Public Board of Health and the report from that office Monday was that the animal was afflicted with rabies.

Mr. Dale informed the Journal that five rabid coyotes have been killed in that vicinity in the past short while and that a dog owned by Mr. Jackson living near there was killed Monday, having been bitten by a coyote, resulting in the development of rabies.

Now that it is positively known that rabies exist it will be well for everyone to be on the alert for any strange actions of their livestock, observing same in order to safe guard against any dangerous results.

Little children going to and from school should be protected from possible attack from the rabid animals.
