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Taking advantage of a brief period when an Oregon county was without the services of a county agent, a swine company promoting the familiar and oft exposed scheme of selling brood sows and promises at high prices, again started operations in this state, says the O. A. C. Some six months ago the animal husbandry department at the state college exposed a similar scheme in Baker and Union counties with the result that the operators faded away, one even failing to settle his hotel bill, according to reports.

The plan is always attractive farmers ever on the outlook for a sure market. The company sells one or more brood sows at a high price and "contracts" to buy back the gilts of the first two litters for \$35 each. The catch in the plan, according to legal authorities, is that the contract is binding on the farmer but not on the company, hence the "sure" market fades away whenever the company cannot easily pass on the gilts to other groups. Farmers are advised by the college to discuss these contracts with their bankers before signing.

RETURNS FROM TOUR

American automobile manufacturers and the American industry generally will not have to guard against any European invasion of the field of Yankee motor car design and engineering in 1929, but lower prices on cars in volume production on the Continent may be expected to add to American car competition overseas, in the opinion of C. W. Nash, president of the Nash Motors Co., whose return from a tour of northern European countries and the annual motor exhibitions in Paris and London has brought new light on the always interesting foreign motor car situation.

Mr. Nash was the guest of honor at motor functions in all of the countries he visited. Dinners and receptions were arranged for the Nash party, which included Mr. and Mrs. Nash, Harold Seaman, president of the Seaman Body Co., which is controlled by the Nash interests; Eric Wahlberg, chief engineer of the Advanced Six Division. In Stockholm the American leader addressed a special Nash organization meeting, and in Paris, where eighteen companies were represented by Nash dealers and distributors. He was the chief speaker at another international Nash meeting. Mr. Nash was one of the principal speakers at re-show banquets for European industrial leaders in both Paris and London.

AWARD OF THE
HOOVER PICTURE

The Republican State Central Committee are giving a photograph framed picture of Hoover and his dog, signed by Hoover personally, to the Republican precinct committeeman in Malheur county in whose precinct is cast the highest percentage of votes for Hoover, based on the entire registration of all parties in his precinct. This seems to be about the only fair the contest could be decided, although many dead names are on the registration list, as they are not removed by the county clerk from the list of qualified voters until the voter has missed one general election, and there are also many who have registered in one precinct and moved to another and registered there.

I have obtained from the county clerk the total number of voters registered in each precinct and number of votes cast for Hoover in that precinct according to the official canvass. This shows Orville Nichols, committeeman in Ironside precinct, to be entitled to the picture. There was 102 total registration in this district and 73 votes cast for Hoover, making his percentage .715 Tracy Mathews, committeeman in Rome precinct, was second with a percentage of .707. Amos Aramburu, committeeman in McDermitt precinct, was third with a percentage of .666.

On account of many unqualified voters still remaining on the registration list, and many qualified voters not voting, Hoover still carried the county by a large majority, yet the percentage in many districts was lower than would be expected from so large a majority in the county.

I want to take this occasion to publicly thank the members of the committee in Malheur county for the splendid work done by them during the campaign.
