

SURETY COMPANY WILL NOT APPEAL BANK DECISION

RECEIVER DAVID F. GRAHAM
RECEIVES GOOD NEWS IN
MAIL MONDAY

DEPOSITORS SHARE IN \$21,000

Second Dividend Will Now Be Issued
To Depositors—Held Up Pending
Surety Course

(From the Malheur Enterprise)
In Monday mail Receiver David F. Graham, of the Farmers and Stock-growers bank, received more good news for the depositors. Attorneys of the Royal Indemnity company, Portland, advised that their company will not appeal from the decision handed down by Federal Judge Bean December 24, in which the federal court ruled that a surety company which has bonded a bank as depository for state funds has no prior or preferred claim upon the assets of the bank if the later becomes insolvent.

The indemnity company brought suit for a decree requiring the state superintendent of banks to approve the preferred claim of the company against the assets of the Vale bank. The claim would have amounted to \$21,000, the amount of the state's deposit in the defunct bank, which the surety company has paid to the state. The federal court's decision puts the surety company on the same plane as the depositor and they will share the same percentage of repayment when each dividend is issued. Had the surety company won the suit, it would have meant a big loss to the depositors. Now they will share alike in the \$21,000.

Payment of another dividend by the Vale bank has been held up during the time allowed by law for appeal. Now that the course of the surety company has been announced, Mr. Graham advises that another dividend will be declared in the very near future. The bank has paid 15 per cent to date.

YELLOWSTONE CUT-OFF SECRETARY NOT WORRIED BY CEDING SUGGESTION

"Since neither the progress nor the
future interests of the Yellowstone
Cut-Off Association will be in any
way affected by the proposed ceding
of Malheur County Oregon land to
the State of Idaho, it is no concern
of theirs and they will not express
any official opinion either for or
against the proposition," advises
Secretary Tanner, Burns.

As Mr. Tanner has frequently
pointed out, it is not the sole aim
of the association to promote the build-
ing of a highway merely for the pur-
pose of carrying tourists through the
country, but the ultimate purpose is
to encourage the development of all
industrial, agricultural and commercial
resources. Furthermore, since the
association is made up of units
from the state of California, Oregon
and Idaho, whether this particular
section of land in question will be-
long to Oregon or Idaho will in no
wise affect the carrying out of these
plans for the development of the country.

Vale Project Now Being Discussed At Washington

Washington, D. C. (Washington
Bureau of the Journal)—A. M.
Davidson, representative of one of
the landowning companies of the
Vale reclamation district, and E. C.
Van Petten of the Owyhee, have ar-
rived here for consultation with re-
clamation officials and members of
the Oregon delegation concerning the
future of the Vale project, congress
having eliminated funds for contin-
uation of construction.

Since \$230,000 will be used in com-
pleting payment of water and in-
cidental rights in the Warm Springs
reservoir and local interests are
prepared to assure full cooperation
in settlement plans, it is thought that
discussions at this time may remove
some of the criticism in congress

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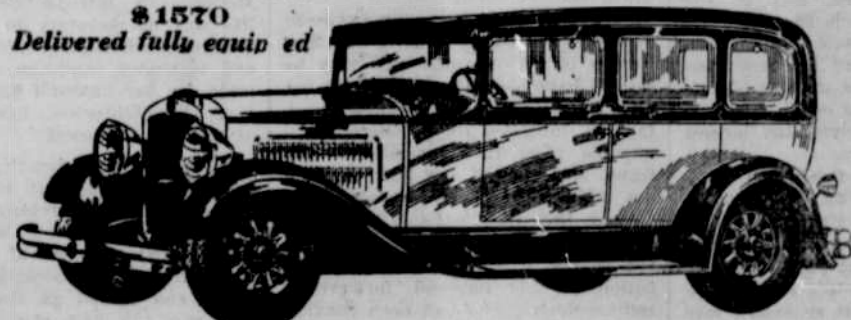
