

MALHEUR COUNTY AGENT FOR DAIRY EXPANSION NOW

PROFITABLE DAIRY COW PAYS
BIG RETURNS FOR ALFALFA
HAY

BUTTERFAT AVERAGE 50 CENTS

Honor Roll Cow Will Return \$30 For
Ton Of Alfalfa Hay— Tribles
\$10 Stack Price

Production of butter fat in Malheur county is about 750,000 pounds annually. The average price for butterfat paid by the Farmers Cooperative Creamery in 1928 was 50 cent per pound, netting an annual income to farmers of \$375,000.

The dairy industry has been growing but it would seem that it should increase more rapidly during the next few years if the growers of alfalfa hay are to protect themselves against possible serious depressions in price. There is apt to be a surplus of hay from the 1929 harvest, County Agent Larson advises.

Mr. Larson estimates that one ton of alfalfa hay will produce 60 pounds of butterfat when fed to a good cow (one producing 300 pounds of butterfat annually), returning to the dairyman \$30. The hay would bring the grower \$10 when sold in the stack.

The county agent favors expansion of the dairy industry in Malheur, in view of low cost of producing forage and other favorable conditions existing here.

HAY GROWERS ADDING NEW FEEDING FACILITIES

While chasing about the country for the purpose of assessing the many transient sheep that have been feeding in Malheur county this winter, County Assessor Graham noted that hay growers are adding new lambing sheds and other feeding facilities to their ranches as an inducement to sheepmen. Hay growers and townfolk find that the sheepmen are good spenders. They buy the hay crop and the towns benefit from heavy supply purchases.

BURRELL BRIDGE WORK BEGINS

It Won't Be Long Now—Good Highway
Between Vale and Harper Will
Be Completed Soon

Rapid progress is being made on the construction of the Vale-Harper link of the Central Oregon highway, work is starting on the bridge across the Malheur river at Burrell station and now for surfacing of the new road so that the many motorists traversing the Vale-Harper link may at last have the convenience of a real highway. J. D. Fairman, county commissioner, went to Portland Thursday night to request the immediate surfacing of the new road by the state highway commission.

Bridge Work Starts
A crew of J. Badraun company, contractor who was awarded the Malheur bridge, arrived here Sunday and on Monday they started the bridge work. The contract calls for completion by July 31st but it is reported that the contractor expects to finish the work before that date.

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BILLINGSLEY FATHERED GASOLINE COWBOY BILL

NEW LAW THEFT PREVENTATIVE
MEASURE—STANDS PAT
FOR TAX PROGRAM

Rustling methods have changed with the times and Senator J. D. Billingsley advised the Malheur Enterprise Saturday that he is of the opinion that stockmen and officials of Oregon will find S. B. 193, "the gasoline cowboy bill," a helpful theft preventative. The provisions of the bill were first suggested at a meeting of eastern Oregon stockmen in Canyon City last fall and the measure, which has now become a law, was fathered by Senator Billingsley in the legislature.

The new law provides that stock to be sold on a large or small scale, must be tagged by the owner to show individual ownership, tags to be secured from the sheriff's office. Officers will inspect any truck load of butchered meat and the farmer must have a certificate of ownership. After Canada's satisfactory method, traffic officials have been made a sort of state constabulary to be on the lookout for the "gasoline cowboy rustlers."

Senator Billingsley also stated that he believes the taxation program, approved by the legislature, is a very constructive step. He has a few "intangibles" that will be taxed but he is firm in the argument that they should be paying a share of the tax burden as well as overtaxed property investments.
