

ORE. CHAMBER OPENING L. A. SETTLEMENT OFFICE

The opening of a land settlement office in Los Angeles on May 1, to disseminate information on the Vale and Owyhee projects and Oregon and to maintain permanent and seasonal exhibits of Oregon products, has been arranged by the state chamber of commerce, according to W. G. Ide, manager, a visitor here Wednesday and Thursday. Mr. Ide advised Irving Province, secretary of the Vale club, that it is estimated that 6000 homeseekers a day come to Los Angeles, the majority of them on a sightseeing trip while contemplating a location. The office will be opened in the downtown district and desirable homeseekers will be routed Vale way first.

The office will distribute Vale-Owyhee cooperative advertising material and Vale's independent literature, Mr. Ide promised, as well as that of other towns.

MALHEUR TURKEY GROWERS SEEK AN INCREASED TARIFF

MRS. C. G. BRINK HELD FIRST
MEETING OF YEAR IN VALE
SATURDAY

WANT FOUR CENT INCREASE

Establishment Of New Grade For
Best No. 2 Turkeys Is Desirable—
Other Problems Discussed

An increase in the tariff on turkeys from 6 cents a pound to 10 cents a pound is to be sought by the Idaho-Oregon Turkey Growers association, according to Mrs. C. G. Brink manager, of Boise, who held the first 1929 meeting with Malheur growers in Vale Saturday.

During the 1928 season Argentine, southern Europe and Russia together shipped 50 per cent more turkeys than they shipped to this country in 1927, Mrs. Brink said. Quality of the foreign birds was good but no better than from the cooperative pool.

The grading at the receiving station was the next problem discussed. Deformities such as crooked breasts, present the most formidable trouble as all of the rest can be prevented by education and the effort of the producer. More careful incubating, brooding and dressing will be the aim of association members this year. The association is conducting an investigation for the prevention of physical deformities. Close grading is necessary as the enviable growth and reputation of the local association is due to uniform high quality of the marketed birds.

However, the addition of another grade is favored. Heretofore, birds have been strictly classed No. 1 and No. 2. A slight defect, of any kind, places an otherwise perfect bird in No. 2 class. The new grade will take in "those almost perfect No. 2's."

Another pool, to be sold in February, making a total of four during the season instead of three, is favored.

The prospects for better prices this year look good. The tariff increase outlook is bright, largely because of Congressman Hawley's chairmanship of the ways and means committee, through which all tariff measures must emanate. Hawley is United States representative of the southern Oregon district and he will have the help of the Oregon and Idaho delegation at the special session which convenes in Washington next Monday.

Membership in the association almost doubled last year. A conference of state turkey associations in the coming summer will effect closer cooperation in the turkey industry, the speaker stated.
