It was regarded as simply terrible the kindly manner New Plymouth sluggers took to Rambaud's offerings in the first inning of the afternoon matinee put on by New Plymouth and Nyssa last Sunday, by the local fans who journeyed to that town. A combination of five hits, one of which was a homer by Woods, and four errors netted New Plymouth six scores. But after that terrific bombardment Rambaud was stingy and New Plymouth was only able to put across one run, in the fifth.

Nyssa annexed three scores in the first frame, Johnson going out on a deep fly to center. Rambaud was given a pass and Diven got on by an error. Lloyd's sacrifice hit advanced Rambaud and Diven to second and third. Rambaud scored when Henry Castle muffed up Long's hot grounder. Herb Hoxie's single put Long and Diven across the pan and Harold Hoxie fanned for the third out.

Neither side scored in the next stanza, but in the third Diven got around the circuit on his own three-bagger and a single by Lloyd. In the sixth, Herb Hoxie garnered his second hit, going to third when his brother, Harold, banged out a two-bagger. Servoss fanned and Green's sacrifice fly to Creasey scored the Hoxie brothers. During the seventh inning Nyssa annexed four more runs to cinch the game. The first men up, Diven and Lloyd, were given walks, Diven running home on Long's single to center. Then Lloyd and Long scored on Herb Hoxie's three-pley hit. Harold Hoxie's four-base wallop was the second homer of the affair. Herb ran home, but Harold was called out for failing to touch second.

Rambaud, but for that fatal first was master of the situation. It was in the fifth that Patterson connected for a single and scored on a sacrifice hit by Small and Diven's error.

FARMERS CO-OP. CREAMERY VOLUME AGAIN SOARING

DAIRYMEN AND THEIR FAMILIES ATTEND ANNUAL MEETING AT WEISER THIS YEAR

Great Creamery Organization is a Monument to Cooperative Marketing By Dairy Farmers

Four thousand and twenty-one members of the Farmers Cooperative creamery company of Idaho and Oregon have been increasing dairy production since the first of the year, the volume of business now exceeding 1928 by about 15 per cent.

Assets of the creamery amount to \$322,000 with no indebtedness. 1928 business aggregated \$3,000,000 and 4,000,000 pounds of butter were manufactured. These and other statistics read by George B. Middleton, accountant, at the annual meeting and picnic of dairymen and officials of the creamery, reflect its healthy financial condition and its tremendous and rapid growth in the space of a few years.

About 6000 people attended the meeting last Thursday in Oregon Trail park, Weiser, each family bringing along their lunch baskets. The creamery provided the finishing touches.

The morning session which convened at 10:30 was taken up in reading of minutes, financial report and the election of directors. Percy Purvis Vale; D. B. Coates and Charles Bolton, Payette; were re-elected to succeed themselves. Ed. Coles, Haines, was elected as a member from the Eastern Oregon Dairymen's association. O. M. Plummer, general manager of the Pacific International Livestock exposition, was the main speaker of the day, taking as his theme his firm belief in the principles of cooperative marketing. A play by Cambridge, Ida., high school students and free merry-go-round rides provided additional entertainment.

The creamery organization is one of the outstanding successes of its kind in the northwest. It has grown from a small beginning to its present great working unit and is a monument to cooperative and "stick-to-itiveness." It is one of the few agencies in the United States who markets its own products through its own medium and does not pay a tribute to the middleman.
