Nyssa's Fight For Idaho Pacific Exciting State-Wide Interest

northern Malheur and western Idaho tonnage south to Winnemucca the position of the carriers in opposition to the cross-state line will be strengthened.

"This Commission has fought a long battle to secure adequate transportation facilities for the entire portion of the state and would gladly and enthusiastically intervene in support of the Nyssa-to-Winnemucca line in the event it would not divert tonnage from the proposed cross-state line, which case has not yet been decided by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

"The cross-state line will give Portland and Willamette Valley an advantage over California points to the products to be produced on the new irrigation projects in Malheur County as well as the products already produced in western Idaho and northern Malheur County. The cross-state line will serve to give a short and direct route to the eastern portion of Oregon, including Nyssa, to the seaports of Oregon, while the Nyssa-to-Winnemucca line will divert tonnage from eastern Oregon and western Idaho to California points and leave Malheur and Harney counties with a long and circuitous route to Portland and Willamette Valley points.

"The cross-state line is also desired by the lumber manufacturers and fruit and vegetable producers of western Oregon in order to secure a more direct and shorter route to eastern markets. The Nyssa-to-Winnemucca line would not benefit any portion of Oregon west of Crane.

"The final arguments in the cross-state case were set for hearing at Washington, D. C., on June 13. The date has recently been postponed, presumably due to the application of the Idaho Pacific Railroad Company for permission to construct the Nyssa-to-Winnemucca line. In any event the state of Oregon is unsuccessful in securing the cross-state line the Commission will gladly intervene in support of the Idaho Pacific Railroad Company's application. U. S. WILL PURCHASE DEADWOOD CLAIMS

According to a Washington, D. C., dispatch in Thursday's issue of the Boise Statesman, owners of the Lee bunch-group of mines, lying in Deadwood reservoir site on the Black Canyon project, have agreed to sell out for \$15,000, after having demanded \$600,000. Reclamation Commissioner Mead Wednesday informed Congressman Burton L. French he will buy the claims at the low figure and within a few days will advertise for bids for the erection of Deadwood dam. The commissioner was about ready to advertise for bids a month ago when the presence of the mining claims became known.

Before advertising for bids, Commissioner Mead wants to know if the plans, as approved a month ago, are still satisfactory to the chief engineer in Denver. On receipt of a reply to this telegraphic inquiry from Washington, the advertisement for bids will issue.
