## THREE-QUARTERS AUTO LICENSE FEE DUE AFTER JUNE 4

Salem, Ore., June 5.—Motorists who have been debating whether to license their automobiles during the month of June and pay a full year's fee therefore, or await the first of July and enjoy the benefit of a half-year rate, will have their problem at least partially helped by an option of the attorney general, just rendered to Secretary of State Hoss, wherein it is held that the new three-quarters license fee is applicable after the new laws go into effect on June 4.

The last session of the legislature provided for a three-quarter fee to be paid after three months of the license year has elapsed, in addition to the present half year, and quarter year periods, but it was not clear that the legislature intended the law to be effective this year. All indications point to the likelihood that the law-makers expected to have this new arrangement go into effect along with the new mid-year license date on July 1, 1930, but the effect of the proceedings has been to let down the bars for those who seek licenses now.

In commenting on the opinion of the attorney general, Secretary of State Hoss said: "This construction will serve to aid a great number of people who need to license their cars just prior to the date of the half-year fee. During 1928 our automobile department registered nearly 3,000 cars, which shows that a great number of persons cannot wait to take advantage of the cheaper rates. This year, after the new law becomes effective June 4, persons

applying for a license need only remit three-fourths of the regular annual license. For example, if the regular license fee is only \$40, the three-fourths fee required during June will amount to \$30. Next year the advantage of this reduced rate will apply earlier in the license year. I regret that this information could not have been given the public earlier, but the matter only recently came up for consideration and the opinion of the attorney general was promptly secured to ascertain the facts in the case."
