NEW U. S. REPORT MAKES US BANNER COUNTY OF OREGON

LATEST AGRICULTURAL ESTIMATE OF 1928 OREGON CROPS IS GREAT BOOSTER

MALHEUR TAKES SWEEPSTAKES

Crop Production Here Tops The State In Wheat, Oats, Barley, Potatoes, Corn, Hay—and Sheep

In 1928, Malheur county shattered grain, hay and potato records of not only but every county in the state of Oregon.

It has often been said that crop production of Malheur's fertile irrigated fields can't be beat, anywhere, but now comes the greatest victory of all for this vast inland empire that is just beginning to see the dawn of development. Boiled down figures of averages for Oregon Crop Production in 1928 compiled by the U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics, Division of Crop and Livestock Estimates, in cooperation with the Oregon Agricultural College Extension Service, show in black and white that MALHEUR COUNTY IS NOT ONLY THE BANNER CROP PRODUCTION COUNTY OF OREGON but that her averages exceed more widely advertised counties of the state by truly marvelous proportions.

Accurate records of average crop production for the year 1928, released this week by F. L. Kent, Portland, agricultural statistician, prove beyond a doubt the outstanding wealth of Malheur soil. They should be a mighty factor in the colonization of Vale project lands, which is now getting underway in the Harper unit, under the able supervision of J. D. Fairman, "one of the fathers of the Vale project," and his corps of helpful assistants of Harper, Ontario, Nyssa and Vale.

SPRING WHEAT—5,500 acres produced 220,000 bushels, average 40 bushels to the acre in Malheur county, the highest production average in the state of Oregon. With a planting of only 100 acres Coos was second with 35. Umatilla's average is 20 bushels; state average 18.8.

WINTER WHEAT—Malheur stands highest with 30 bushels per acre in the great wheat counties of eastern Oregon. With another small acreage of winter wheat, Coos ran 35, state average 23.

OATS—Malheur shattered another state record, with 2,200 acres producing 50 bushels per acre on an average. Crook and Deschutes are tied for second ribbon with an average of 45 bushels, state average 36.

BARLEY—4,000 acres averaged 48 bushels to the acre, topping eastern Oregon counties that are next high with 40 bushels. A small acreage, 500 acres in Coos, topped western Oregon records with a yield of 60 bushels. State average 35.

Oregon sweepstakes 2500 acres yielding 450,000 bushels, average 180 bushels to the acre. The average ran around 120 bushels per acre in Oregon.

CORN—Malheur topped the records for eastern Oregon, average 45 bushels to the acre; Hood River and Umatilla, second, with 35. A small planting of 1800 acres in Josephine, western Oregon, ran 50. The average for the state is 36.

TAME HAY—Malheur takes the sweepstakes, 33,000 acres producing 3.5 tons on the average; Tillamook, second, with 3 tons; state average 2.25 tons.

WILD HAY—24,000 acres averaged 1.25 tons; Hood River high in eastern Oregon with 1.50 tons; state average 1.20 tons.

Estimated numbers of livestock in Malheur county, give some data in this big half of our agricultural wealth; sheep, 365,000, the largest number of sheep in any county in Oregon; Lake, second, with 228,000; horses 14,500; mules, 1440; goats 125; hogs 9000; beef cattle 36,870, third high in state; dairy cows 7130. Malheur carload fruit shipment in 1928; apples 175, pears 78, pears 4.

FILE APPEAL NOTICE IN OWYHEE DITCH CASES

APPEAL TAKEN FROM DECREE OF MALHEUR CIRCUIT COURT IN FEBRUARY

Attorneys of the Owyhee Ditch company have served notice of appeal from the decree of the circuit court in February, enjoining the ditch company from removing the stop-gate used by J. C. McConnell, Nyssa rancher. As a number of other pending cases involve the same principal, the case is being watched with a great deal of interest by all water users.

The parties involved took water from the Owyhee ditch by gravity flow for many years, up to 1919. Then the company enlarged and deepened the ditch, it resulting that a number of users found the water surface at normal flow below the bottom of their headgates, making it impossible to irrigate throughout the season by gravity flow. To raise the water into the headgates, stop-gates were installed and they were used continuously until 1928. Then the company ordered removal of the stop-gates, citing as their authority a company by-law. Eight users brought suit and temporary injunctions were issued restraining the company from removing the stop-gates.

In the McConnell case, the only one tried to date, the temporary injunction was made permanent. Questions involve the right of a stockholder to bring this suit against his company; has the company waived its right to enforce the by-law by reason of its acquiescence in the use of a stop-gate over a period of years; and can the company deprive a land owner of a gravity flow right used for a great many years and compel him to resort to pumping.

The circuit court held that this was not a suit of a minority stockholder but of an individual to protect a property right; that the company had not the right to deprive the user of a gravity flow right.

Attorneys E. M. Blodgett and Lytle represented McConnell, Lees and Lees, the ditch company.

WEISER HANDS NYSSA FIRST DEFEAT SUNDAY

By the breaks of the game all going Weiser's way, the recently rejuvenated line-up of the Idaho town's nifty team was able to overcome Nyssa, the league leaders 5 to 2, in a breath-taking game at that town last Sunday afternoon. 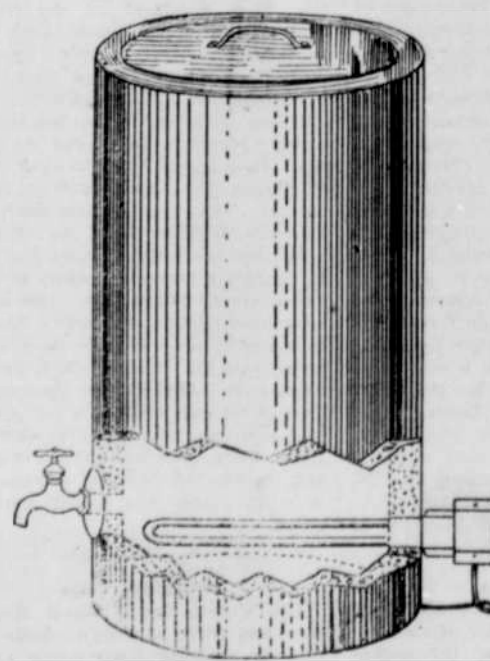
