

COWBOY TRAILED ALLEGED RUSTLERS

ROAST BEEF DINNER MAY BE
COSTLY FOR VAQUEROS
OF INTERIOR

The vigilance of Norman Camp, 25-year old buckaroo, in watching his employer's cattle herds on the Succor Creek range in Malheur county, resulted in the arrest of Ray Bay, George Hinton and Clifford Feltwell, three young vaqueros, and B. F. Butts, an older man. Charged with "larceny of an animal," the four plead not guilty. The younger trio have been released on \$500 bond each. Butts could not provide \$750 bond required and is being held in the county jail at Vale.

Cattle owned by Tarr and Mercer and A. P. Cunningham have been feeding on the Succor creek range with Camp looking after them. When he missed three of the animals, Camp followed a trail for nine miles into an almost inaccessible canyon to find evidence that an animal had been recently butchered. He found a head and a part of a hide in the remains of a fire which had evidently been built to burn the evidence of butchery.

Camp continued to the Geisey ranch, headquarters of the vaqueros who had been riding for horses, and

there he found some freshly roasted beef in an oven. He notified Cunningham who in turn notified Malheur county officials. The men were arrested and brought to Vale.

MALHEUR'S CENTRAL OREGON WORK AGAIN PUT ON THE SHELF

By recent order of the state highway department, the graveling crew of the Burrell-Harper link of the Central Oregon highway will consist of Patrolman Frank Michaels and his assistant, P. H. Ennis. The road is to wait for its needed surfacing until next spring, it has been said. Michaels will take care of the recently graded road, however, and it will be kept in fairly good condition for travel.

It seems that funds for this end of the Central Oregon have been exhausted for the current year, although there is much construction activity on the Burns-Bend link. In addition to the request for surfacing of this much traveled link this year, it is Malheur's plea that the survey to the Harney junction be made this year. To date the survey ends a few miles beyond Harper.

Again, work has been retarded on this end of the oldest road on the program of the state highway department, regardless of numerous requests for its completion.

ONTARIO WINNER OVER NYSSA SUNDAY

A radical change in the Nyssa line-up, together with a flock of errors pulled off at critical periods in the game, were responsible for Nyssa's decisive defeat by Ontario, 8 to 2, at the fair grounds in that town last Sunday afternoon. The distressing affair was witnessed by what is said to have been the largest crowd to attend a game so far this year.

The games Sunday afternoon were the first of the second-half series which end Sunday, July 21.

At Ontario, Sunday, this was how things happened: In the second, Bird, the first man up for Ontario, was an easy out. Madden was given a pass. McLee tapped one to Johnston what should have been a double out, but Hoxie failed to cover second and all hands were safe. Brennan hit one to Rambaud who threw Madden out at third. Alexander's roller was muffed by Hoxie and McLee scored from second. Huffman fanned.

Ontario scored again in the third. McCullough got to first on Servoss' error. He advanced to second on Long's infield out and ran home on Hughes' single.

In the fifth, Long singled for Ontario. Rambaud then hit Hughes. Bird was an easy out, the runners advancing to third and second. Madden, next up, slammed a single to right, scoring Long and Hughes. McLee's hit to shortstop was interfered with by Madden, causing Lloyd to fumble and all hands were safe. Madden should have been called out, but his ump saw otherwise. Brennan then got a single scoring Madden. McLee going to second. Brennan was thrown out at home, trying to score Alexander's tap. Huffman was safe on a fielder's choice, both runners advancing when Servoss dropped Rambaud's throw of McCullough's easy tap. Log then got his second hit of the inning, scoring Alexander and Huffman. Hughes walked and Bird was an easy out to retire the side.

Nyssa came to life in the seventh. Field fouled out to Long. Duncan singled and Hanks flew out to Hughes. Servoss got a two-bagger to right and Hoxie, who was running for Duncan, went to third. Johnston was thrown out trying to make third. The line-up:

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SCHOOL BUS BUSINESS AND NEW EXPENSE ANGLE CONSIDERED BY COUNTY

The county court and Mrs. Crail, meeting here Wednesday as the district boundary board, heard requests for a number of rural school bus lines. It was decided that Nyssa and Ontario school districts may both continue the operation of their routes to Arcadia, as they have in the past. No changes were made. Judge H. Lee Noe asked for an estimate of expense and if the cost is equitable, it is probable that in the future the cost of operating busses for the transportation of high school pupils will be paid out of the county tuition fund, if funds permit, as provided by the last legislature. The cost report will be made at the July meeting.

J. Rufino Arrien, well known Westfall sheepman who was in town Monday, told of the sale of his 4200 lambs to F. C. Oxman at \$10 and \$9 per head. He reports that most of the sheepmen of the interior have sold. W. P. 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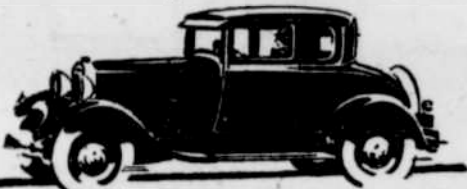
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
